"This was Marianna's second year at TWT (Talking with Technology) camp. She seemed to blossom this year. This year she was more comfortable with her "talking" device, and we could tell she was excited about going to camp. She was positively influenced by the other children having devices. We have seen her using her device with more confidence since coming home. The TWT camp is a great concept. Combining speech therapsists, augmentative communication devices with children and counselors at camp is a winning combination. Children have a chance to communicate, using their devices, in a fun environment with other children. They get to be kids at camp like any other kids. We can't say thank you enough. You have given our child the gifts of adventure, fun, and communication. You are truly amazing people."

I want to acknowledge our partner in providing funding for the TWT Camp. The Rollie R. Kelley Family Foundation is helping make communication possible. For those who don't know, Illustrious Brother Rollie Kelley was a trustee of the Foundation and an esteemed Denver Consistory member until his passing in 1999. So, to all of my Brethren from far and wide, whether your Christmas be snow, or hot and dry,


may the Architect grant his celestial boon and keep your good health 'til we meet again soon.

Here's What We're Doing



For those who have just experienced the 29 degrees in our last Reunion, one point that really stands out. We seek knowledge from those who lived in the past. Now, we are a very advanced civilization. We have visited other planets, are learning more each year about the basic building blocks for our bodies, can build and maintain very advanced and complex systems and structures. What makes this old wisdom so important to us?

It is a question that comes up in my studies all the time, in many different ways. Albert Pike, who revised and wrote the Scottish Rite degrees recognized this and so did many men who preceded him. He saw and used what others knew and built upon their understandings to present many deep topics to us.

We forget or choose not to see, that there were individuals throughout all ages that were ahead of their time in thought and actions. These men could understand and think of principles and formulas that generations of men who followed them could not. Or did not make the time to do. And the philosophies and principles they came up with or were revealed to them, still stand the test of time.

Is this really true? Yes. The important questions of life have not changed, whether they are asked twenty years ago, a hundred and twenty or over two thousand. What is our Creator like? What is mankind's relationship to this Being? How should man treat each other? What happens when we die? Man has a need to understand and the answers found, are just seen through eyes and ears of people with different surroundings.

No wonder Pike and others well known Masonic writers revered some of these exceptional men, who figured out some very deep philosophical relationships, made advancements in science and geometry with less advanced equipment, without the ease of knowledge or the freedoms we have.

Many wise men, much smarter than ourselves, found the ancients to be their contemporaries in many fields. We should do the same. Not to reject modern thought and knowledge, but to blend this with the ancient knowledge and use both together.

We can still see today, some of the surviving structures that these ancient men built. They far outlast what we build today and we would have a hard time doing the same and at great cost. People who came before us do have a lot to teach us.
