# FEATURED ARTICLE

### 18°-KNIGHT ROSE CROIX

(Editor's Note: For some time now, we have had requests for brief articles about the various degrees. Ill. Bro. John Warren chose the 18th degree - and others will follow in no particular order or with any specific frequency.)

Even though there are several Degrees in the Chapter of Knights Rose Croix in the Southern Jurisdiction, we will be concentrating on the 18<sup>th</sup> Degree. This is one of the most powerful and moving degrees of the Scottish Rite. *It is also one of the most fragile.* The degree is a series of contrasting moods and it's power comes from those moods

You may have acted in this degree before; you may have worked on one of the Committees before; you may be the Director General and Assistant Director General; or perhaps you are a sideliner; all of whom have experienced the exemplification of the 18<sup>th</sup> Degree several times before and may think they know it inside and out. Well, read on! You may not know it as well as you think.

From mastermason.com, we are told that in this degree, the lessons taught are that man must have a new Temple in his heart where Deity is worshipped in spirit and in truth and that he must have a new law of love which all men everywhere may understand and practice. This degree affirms the broad principles of universality and tolerance.

We know from Morals and Dogma that the Degree of Rose Croix teaches three things; the unity, immutability and goodness of God; the immortality of the soul; and the ultimate defeat and extension of evil and wrong and sorrow by a Redeemer.

Further, we are told that the obligations of our Ancient Brethren of the Rose Croix were to fulfill all the duties of friendship, cheerfulness, charity, peace, liberality, temperance and chastity; and scrupulously avoid impurity, haughtiness, hatred, anger and every other type of vice.

Prior to the exemplification of this Degree, at every Reunion, the candidates are told "This Degree has long held a special place of honor. As one of the most philosophical and practical Degrees in Freemasonry, it encourages earnest thought and introspection."

The first apartment is filled with despair and sorrow. The pace of this apartment is slow because it takes energy for despair, and the mood IS despair, not depression. The true word is lost.

The second apartment represents "the abode of the damned". This is accomplished by lighting and sound effects, as well as by the Master of Ceremonies giving instruction to the candidate in the proper manner.

In the Third Apartment, as in the first, mood is very important. The Third Apartment is bright. Everyone is happy. The True Word has been found.

#### 18° - Knight Rose Croix Degree (continued)

Music, both recorded and live, is very important throughout the exemplification of the Degree. Music is at a slower tempo in the First Apartment to underscore the despair and sorrow. In the Second Apartment, music is much louder to help the Master of Ceremonies emphasize the seriousness of his instructions to the Candidate. In the Third Apartment, after the True Word has been discovered, the music is more spiritually uplifting.

There is one overriding purpose which must motivate everything that happens inside the auditorium. The candidates must receive the best, the most powerful, most compelling Degree which the total resources of the Consistory can provide.

The individual egos, the comfort of actors, the turf-wars of directors must be sacrificed to that goal. To exemplify a degree is the most serious and fraternal responsibility any of us can undertake, because the Candidate's knowledge, his feeling for and dedication to the Rite, and his progress as a Mason is at stake with every Degree presented.

As actors, when we accept a role in this and any other Degree, we incur that fraternal responsibility. To say that we "KNOW" a part so well that we do not need rehearsals is doing a dis-service to the rest of the cast, as well as to the Candidates. Actors should sit back and revel in the contribution they are making to help educate our new Brethren.

It is interesting to note that in the Northern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite, there are only two degrees in what they call the CHAPTER OF ROSE CROIX, the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> Degrees. The presiding Officer is called the Most Wise Master. The 18<sup>th</sup> Degree itself is called the Knight of the Rose' Croix of H.R.D.M.. The lessons taught are much the same as in the Southern Jurisdiction.

Albert Einstein said: "Strange is our situation here on earth. Each of us comes for a short visit, not knowing why, yet sometimes seeming to a divine purpose. From the standpoint of daily life, however, there is one thing we do know. That we are here for the sake of others ... for the countless unknown souls with whose fate we are connected by a bond of sympathy. Many times a day, I realize how much my outer and inner life is built upon the labors of people, both living and dead, and how earnestly I must exert myself in order to give in return as much as I have received."

GENERALLY speaking, it is NOT a good idea to try to have your blood drawn AT our fair if you are volunteering that day. It CAN be arranged, but remember you will be fasting for at least 12 hours and trying to get set up for the fair that morning on an empty stomach until a phlebotomist gets set up. You also have to register as a volunteer AND as a participantalthough your pre-registration online will streamline that second part.

# ... And, the SURVEY SAYS ...

As you know, we released a short survey a couple of months ago to try to determine how well the Consistory communicates with our membership, and to ask a number of questions specifically about the RiteWorks e-newsletter.

With around 1400 members in the Consistory for which we have email accounts – we received 118 responses. That's about an 8.5% response and is considered a "fair" return in statistical terms. Obviously, we would have LIKED to get a better response from our membership, because we REALLY wanted to know how our membership felt about our efforts to improve communications.

- Over 93% said they READ the Riteworks, to some degree or another, every month, with 76% saying they read most or all of it.
- 85% said they felt the SIZE of the RiteWorks (number of pages) was "about right".
- 81% of you think we're "Satisfactory" or "Very Effective" in our communications with membership
- Almost 15% think we could be doing a better job – which is a pretty significant commentary.

We can't please EVERYONE, but we can sure TRY to work on being better about communicating with that 15%. There are some things we CAN do, and some that are frankly out of our control.

We are pursuing expansion of our tools into the various "social media" outlets (FACEBOOK, TWITTER, LINKEDIN, etc) and you will see changes during this year.

With 118 responses to the survey, as you might expect, we have a wide variety of recommendations for us to work on. The TOP THREE (not in any particular order of significance) were:

- IMPROVE PARKING
- MORE EDUCATION
- SLOW DOWN THE PACE OF DEGREES AT A RE-UNION

"Fixing" the parking problem is a complicated and convoluted issue - one that has been with us for a long time. We will continue to TRY to work the issue, but we all should be realistic about the odds of making significant headway any time soon.

You will be seeing more educational opportunities in our activities – sometimes at the meetings, sometimes at other activities we sponsor. There are some things that we MUST do by charter and by regulation, but we'll continue to work on this aspect of our operations.

Slowing down the "pace" of degrees is something that is VERY COMPLEX – and affects a lot of our membership. All we can say is, our Director General and the Degree Council will continue to examine ways to improve the delivery of our degrees during a reunion, and we hope you will participate and help us improve by letting us know what works and what doesn't.

Meanwhile, we will continue to use periodic short surveys to get your opinions and recommendations. PLEASE - when you get a notice about a survey in the future, ANSWER IT so we can get a true indicator of the wishes of our membership.

ANY help in identifying the Brothers from past reunions will be GREATLY appreciated!




#### THE PRELATE'S PULPIT






