Editor's Note: While it is just a smidgen late, this article on the significance of St. John the Baptist was provided on another forum and is reproduced here with the kind permission of Rev. Bro Cerda.

The Importance of John the Baptist for Freemasons Today A Table Lodge address to Sparrow Lodge #400 F&AM, Sunbury, Ohio on June 17, 2014

As I join in fellowship with you tonight, on the eve of the Feast of St. John the Baptist, I am reminded of the words I committed to heart and memory as an Entered Apprentice: "From whence came you? From the Lodge of the Holy Saints John at Jerusalem. What came you here to do? To learn to subdue my passions and improve myself in masonry." Within that time I also learned about a symbol within the Lodge of a point within a circle, bounded by two parallel tangent lines, representing the Holy Saints John.

Over time, I also became quite familiar with sitting in a Lodge "erected to God and dedicated to the Holy Saints John." This phrase may be an allusion to the birth of the Grand Lodge of England on Saint John's Day, June 24, 1717. But how did we come to honor John the Baptist in a Lodge of Freemasonry?

For those of you who may feel a bit rusty in your memory of the history of Christianity, the period beginning with Emperor Diocletian in 284 AD was a time of Great Persecution. During this time, the church would celebrate feast days at the same time as pagan holidays, so as not to stand out. June 24th, believed to be the longest day of the year, was declared St. John the Baptist day, while December 27th, the shortest day was dedicated to St, John the Evangelist. This would continue until Emperor Constantine would be converted and recognize Christianity as the official religion.

Once Christianity became the religion of the Empire, the church would openly celebrate feast days and they became a part of culture. Operative Freemasonry was first developed when Roman Catholicism was the prevailing religion, and these feast days continued under the Church of England. It was common for guilds and other trade groups to adopt a patron Saint or two. Some Masons picked both Saints John, and over the centuries, Masons commonly celebrated them on their feast days with banquets.

Curiously, even though Freemasonry today is non-denominational and non-sectarian, American Masons have retained some of these customs of old. Part of the ritual in America says that Masons come "from the Holy Saints John of Jerusalem". John the Baptist was zealous, while John the Evangelist was learned, and by picking both of them as patron saints, Masons symbolically unite both passion and reason. (Steve Whittaker)

As we learn in the Christian tradition, john the Baptist was the cousin of Jesus of Nazareth. He was the one who came first, the "voice crying in the wilderness" who prepared the way and baptized Jesus in the Jordan. He lived a simple life, dining on the delicacy of locusts. He was arrested, imprisoned and eventually beheaded by Herod for his devotion and refusal to waver in his message. Through his life he maintained fidelity to his faith and integrity in the way he lived.

The ancient historian Josephus, mentions John the Baptist in his book *Antiquities*. He writes: "For John was a pious man, and he was bidding to the Jews who practiced virtue and exercised righteousness toward each other and piety toward God..." We also learn from Luke's gospel that John taught "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." He taught tax collectors to not collect more than due and for soldiers to be satisfied with their wages and refrain from improving their lives at the expense of others. We might say that John the Baptist taught people to walk uprightly before God and humans, act with integrity, be virtuous and practice charity. As another writer offers: "John's ethical teaching...indicates that John advocated...an eschatological [or one that is not otherwise observed on earth] brotherhood." With these qualities in mind then, is it no wonder we revere him as a patron saint of Freemasonry?

Yet for me, the question is not about why we remember John the Baptist in Freemasonry. Perhaps more pertinent and pressing is the question of how remembering John this evening can inform our current context of Freemasonry.

We live in a fractured world today. Everywhere we look we see discord and disagreement. In the arenas of politics, religion, economics, and in our communities there is stratification, disharmony, disunity and separatism.

When we enter the Lodge, we find ourselves on the level. When we enter the Lodge, we seek that which is other than our present world, an eschatological Brotherhood, firmly grounded in the tenets Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth; committed to the virtues of Faith, Hope and Charity; and dedicated to the memory and lessons of the Holy Saints John. And yet these are not values which we simply remember as having guided us in the past, they are also those values which challenge, inspire and lead us into the future. And the tenets which we hold most dearly in our beloved Fraternity are precisely those which our world needs to see enacted and exemplified today. In other words, we seek and model a better way in the world—as a voice in the wilderness in which we live.

In closing tonight, I would like to share with you a portion of the opening ritual in New Hampshire. As a Past Master I have spoken them many times from the East and hold them dear. I

believe they speak well to our remembrance of Saint John the Baptist and our Fraternity, in this Lodge dedicated to the Holy Saints John this evening:

The ways of Virtue are beautiful, knowledge is attained by degrees, Wisdom dwells with contemplation, there we must seek her. Let us then Brethren apply ourselves with becoming zeal to the practice of the excellent principles inculcated by our order, Let us ever remember that the great objects of our association are the restraint of improper desires and passions, the cultivation of an active Benevolence, and the promotion of a correct knowledge of the duties we owe to God, our neighbor, and ourselves. Let us be united and practice with assiduity, the Sacred Tenets of our order, Let all private animosities, if any unhappily exist, give place to affection and Brotherly Love. It is a useless parade to talk of the subjection of irregular passions within the walls of the Lodge, if we permit them to triumph in our intercourse with each other. Uniting in the grand design, let us be happy ourselves, and endeavor to promote the happiness of others. Let us cultivate the great moral virtues laid down on our Masonic trestleboard, and improve on everything that is good, amiable and useful. Let the benign genius of the Mystic Art preside over our councils, and under her sway let us act with a dignity becoming the high moral character of our venerable institution.

SO MOTE IT BE.

How do you learn?

One of the most common questions asked me is how do I learn all that I do. That is a humbling and complex question. Does the questioner want to know the physical act of how I gather information and the putting it together? Or is it the connecting the dots on the bits of information which makes it understandable and enlightening?

The physical process is pretty easy. Read, think, make notes, read some more, think some more and reorganize the thoughts and finish your conclusions - sounds easy enough. The methods are not unique; there is nothing mystical or deep surrounding the formalizing of talks, lectures or columns. Anyone can do it.

The tough part is having the time and right frame of mind to do this. For it takes much more than the few minutes to just sit down and write a column of 600-700 words. There is gathering information, thinking and meditating on what was found, adding to that what was known already and pulling up a few good pictures to complement the topic. The last lecture I did for the Knights of St. Andrew lasted only 15 minutes, but was made up of 26 pages of notes; hours of study for a talk used only once.

Is all this worth it? Yes. You learn with each topic that adds to what was already known and understood. There are some things to consider when thinking about learning in general and with all we have open to us in Masonry:

- Understand that not everything will be found in the pages of a book.
- Many principles are hinted at or veiled, which hinder our consideration; this should not stop you, but may take longer to grasp what you are learning.

- Some sources of information are not readily attainable, but well worth having. Always be ready to seek information in the uncommon.
- Everyone has a different perspective and it is only when you see multiple explanations on one topic and in as original source as you can get that you really get to grasp what a degree or a topic is all about.
- Prepare yourself to learn! (Probably the most under used principle for all this).
- Ask what is your reason or motive to learn?
- Do you set it as a priority and have the time and energy to do it?
- Do you respect and honor Wisdom and give Understanding a high place of reverence?
- Don't rush to conclusions. Make notes on what you know currently and add to it as opportunity allows. It may surprise you on how your thinking will change.
- It is easy to just copy what others have to say on a topic, but be original!




The path to knowing is a walk through time, facts and understanding. Always remember what is taught all Masons in their first degree – "Seek, Knock, Ask and it will be given to you".

Where do you fit in? What are your interests? What is your area of expertise that you feel may benefit the Consisto-

ry? Where do you feel the most comfortable?

The big question many Brothers have is how do you get there? Who do you ask? What all is involved in letting someone know of your interests? The answer is to simply call the Office and Audrey, Tom, or I can steer you to the right committee Chairman.

The following two quotes came from the internet under something called: **How to Fit In,**By an eHow Contributor. "The desire to fit in can lead to you compromising your morals or not being your true self." "The best way to fit in is to learn more about who you are first."

Do you prefer working in front of the lights as an actor or behind the scenes? Do you really know what you are looking for? What level of responsibility are you capable of? How well do you interact with your Brothers? Do you have patience? How well do you listen to others? Yes, sometimes we all would like to be leaders and decision makers because our ideas are best, but are they really?

What are your talents, interests, strengths, weaknesses, passions, values, and beliefs?

<u>Do you consider yourself a Ritualist?</u> We have two Reunions a year and are continually looking for members who can present the work in a dramatic fashion. We start our practices usually a month or so before both our Spring and Fall Reunions. Depending on the director, there are usually between two to four rehearsals before the exemplifications during the Reunions. All of the Degrees have both large and small parts as well as non-speaking parts.

<u>Do you have technical expertise?</u> Our audio/visual department is another way to display your talents. We have a sound board which controls a bank of microphones. We have the capability to pump music and sound effects through our auditorium speaker system. We have a light board which manages different lighting effects throughout the auditorium, supported by manned spotlights. Also controlled by this department are visual displays projected on a large screen positioned in the auditorium.

<u>Are you looking for something more physically demanding?</u> Our stage and properties crews are always on the go. Moving props around, changing backdrops, floor coverings and major pieces of scenery between degree presentations are the main job of these two Committees Coordinating with the directors and other department heads is where the real skill comes into play.

<u>Business of the Consistory.</u> We are a Fraternity, but we must operate like a business. To become involved with some of the business committees you must first understand the background behind the organization. One way to obtain this knowledge is to enter into one of the four lines of officers. Displaying traits of leadership usually affords an invitation to become a line officer. (continued on page 11)


