

Masonic Band Camp Is 2nd Place In The Greeley Stampede Parade



The 13th Annual Colorado Masonic High School Band Camp was held June 30 to July 4, in Greeley, Colorado. Masonic Lodges, Masonic Family groups and Friends sponsored the students. The band was made up of 101 students selected by their band directors from 51 High Schools throughout the state of Colorado. If selected the students come free except for transportation to and from Greeley.


Music activities of the band were under the supervision of Dr. Richard Mayne, Dr. Kevin Droe and other members of the music faculty and staff of the University of Northern Colorado. The chaperones are members of the Masonic family volunteering their time to host and watch over the students.

The Band performed a free public Concert in the UNC Student Union on July 3, and marched in the Greeley Stampede Parade accompanied by Grand Master, Michael L. McMillan, and many of the Grand Lodge Officers on July 4th. The streets were lined with thousands of spectators. The Band's banner was carried by members of Job's Daughters from Greeley followed by three Chaperones dressed as colonials carrying the flags of our Country and State.

Mrs. Mildred Jones of the Grand Lodge staff was recognized at the Concert with a bouquet of flowers for her hard work, skill, and many efforts supporting the Band.

A few years ago year the Band Camp established the Harry L. Lindstrom, Jr. Scholarship. This is a program in conjunction with the University of Northern Colorado Pride of the Rockies Marching Band that is under the direction of Dr. Richard Mayne. The Scholarships consist of two \$1,000.00 matching grants. Dr. Richard Mayne the director of the Pride of the Rockies Marching Band, matches the Band's \$1,000 and two recipients receive \$1,000 each. The scholarship commemorates Harry L. Lindstrom Jr. who was one of the founders of the Band Camp.

The Band camp is a 501(c)3 Tax exempt organization and any financial support is greatly appreciated.

“Silence Is Golden”

Vide, Aude, Tace [Latin: Know, Dare, Be Silent]

Silence, obedience, and fidelity are the first three principles found in the Scottish Rite's degrees. They are surrounded by thoughts on Hiram's death, dualism, the Kabbalah, and all the excitement of the start of a great journey in our Reunions. All three principles are also taught in the Blue Lodge setting, two of them are put to the forefront over and over. One is always in the background—silence. Maybe that is the best place for it. Silence is not an active characteristic that gets much glory and fanfare. Yet here it is, at the start of our journey, and solidly important. Silence is much more than keeping secrets. It is a way of life, a way to progress through it and a principle that affects all else that we do.

Why am I putting such an emphasis on such a small, simple part of a much larger theme? I find that learning to be silent, to be able to use that silence to your advantage and to get the most out of this is much harder than we like to admit. Silence should be your friend. Yet, it is crowded out so easily by the world. Silence is pushed out by chaos and all the noise which seems to surround us. In a time where every popular star is loose and free with their personal information or they look for opportunities to expose others, Masons are encouraged to do the opposite.

Silence is what you have many times when you are alone. When was the last time you were REALLY alone—away from the television, your radio or a cell phone (or any form of them)? This is hard to do these days, everyone wants a piece of you and your time; they want to be in instant contact with you and demand your attention. Silence is about keeping secrets, not sharing principles we have been taught with outsiders; but it can also be a way to learn. The regular definition of this word is much different than the Masonic use of it. Webster's gives the following normal definition:

*The state of being silent; entire absence of sound or noise; absolute stillness.
Forbearance from, or absence of, speech; taciturnity; muteness.*

I used to think silence was just the first step of many and not that important as you progress in regards to other principles taught us. Lately, I am realizing that silence is an important part of who we need to be. When Aristotle was asked what was the most difficult for him, he replied "to be secret and silent." Do you want to learn about the Scottish Rite? The mystery religions, or eternal truth? Learn to put yourself in a place and state of mind to be separate and silent. This simple act will free up mind space and help you to find what you desire. The time taken to do this will open up many new paths to your learning and it will surprise you what will enlighten your mind.



Secrecy and silence do go well together. They complement each other and help the seeker to find what he desires. They are like Boaz and Jachin. Yet, many never think of silence as a part of anything. Silence seems to be what you leave behind, what you work against and what you seek to replace. Yet, learning how to develop this helps you to slow down, open your mind and to concentrate, multi-tasking does not go well with this principle. Be single-minded, quiet and specific. Silence will reward you with ideals and thoughts that you never could have imagined. It will be a help, and a preparation to many good things. Don't let the world confuse you in this - silence is important. It has been misunderstood for many years as unprofitable, a "lack of" instead of something else better, and an unwanted aspect of life. Silence is not what most think it is. Learn to have it become a part of your life. Be comfortable with it and embrace it.



The Fourth Degree –Secret Master

(NOTE: The Fourth Degree is the third to be profiled for RiteWorks and the Newsletter, with the 30° and 32° Degrees to follow within the next few months.)

The work of the Scottish Rite is to inspire and teach man that he must improve, refine, and perfect himself. The degrees are a journey towards ever broadening horizons of knowledge and teach of a nobler Virtue, Honor, and Truth.

From *A Bridge to Light*¹, we know that the 4° through 14° are called the “Ineffable Degrees” because their principal purpose is the investigation and contemplation of the ineffable name of Deity. The word *ineffable* derives from Latin *ineffabilis* which means something which should not be spoken.

The Deity is thus not an object of knowledge, but of faith, not to be approached by the understanding, but by the moral sense; not to be conceived, but to be felt. The 4° emphasizes duty, fidelity, Integrity, and the necessity for secrecy in all confidential relationships.

Prior to the exemplification of this degree, the Class of new Brothers is told that the Degree opens with the sadness and sorrow that followed the untimely death of our Grand Master Hiram Abif. They are told that as they begin their journey towards spiritual knowledge, that their eyes are enabled to discern truth from error.

The class is instructed on their obligations as Masons to serve their fellow man and their Country. They are informed that they must work for work’s sake without thought of reward or recognition.

What follows these instructions is the exemplification of the 4° in dramatic form. This dramatic form is enhanced by the period costumes worn by the actors, the elocution of the actors, the props used, the lighting and sound provided by the Audio/Visual crew, and of course, by the accompanying music.

Music often can add to the effectiveness of this or any other degree as well as for the enjoyment of the audience. Denver Consistory is fortunate in having a crew capable of providing pre-recorded music as needed, as well as having a live band. Caution should be taken to determine when pre-recorded music is more appropriate to the action on the floor and when “live” music is best. One “size” does not fit all occasions.

Acting techniques used by the actors in the 4° can send a message without words. The primary mood of the 4° is sorrow. The Lodge is in mourning for the death of Hiram. It is important not to let the pace of this degree drag. The pace should be slow, but the energy level high.



Masonic funeral services were recently held for Past Grand Master, Ill R. Keith Milheim, 33° in what we have called the “auditorium.” For several years, I have been suggesting changing the name of the auditorium to a more meaningful name. Recently, the Executive committee voted to change the name of the auditorium to its original name, “The Cathedral Room.” Many Scottish Rite Centers are currently called Masonic Cathedrals. Despite their name and appearance, they are NOT churches. They are Masonic meeting halls intended for the ceremonies and rituals of Freemasonry. They are also used as venues for other non-Masonic events such as concerts, meetings, and so on.

Masons have traced their lineage to the guild organizations of the stoneworkers who built the great cathedrals of Europe. Many of the cathedrals contain masonic symbols. 
