Speech Therapist Providing Therapy by Telepractice

TELEPRACTICE

An Emerging Approach in Helping Children Communicate

Telepractice is the delivery of speech therapy for children by videoconferencing over the internet. On-line interaction between child and therapist provides opportunities for children who might not otherwise receive speech therapy unless traveling many miles to a clinic. The videoconferencing is received either in the child's home or in a convenient location within the family's community.

Since the fall of 2012, when Children's Hospital Colorado began serving children by telepractice, 22 Colorado children have been served. Eight of these children were approved for RiteCare financial assistance. Children's Hospital Colorado continues to evaluate children who are potential candidates for telepractice; many of these children will be enrolled in the coming months.

Children in the following 19 communities have been or are currently being served.

Eastern Colorado – Hugo

Northeastern Colorado – Akron, Brush, Fort Morgan

Northwestern Colorado – Craig, Fraser, Granby, Winter Park

Western Colorado – Whitewater

Southwestern Colorado – Cortez, Dolores, Ignacio, Olathe, Pagosa Springs

Southern Colorado – Cañon City

Southeastern Colorado – Beulah, Lamar, Las Animas

Front Range – Thornton

Parents are very involved in making telepractice successful. They work actively with the speech therapist in preparing for and participating in each telepractice session. It is an excellent way for encouraging parental involvement in the therapy process.

FROM THE WEST ROCKY MOUNTAIN CHAPTER, ROSE CROIX

The cross is a symbol that since ancient times has been sacred to many cultures and peoples around the world and has long signified life and eternity. The rose has long been associated with the dawn and with new beginnings. Thus, together the rose and cross allude to the hope and trust of the dawn of eternal life, or the flowering of new life after death. For the same reasons, the Rose Croix Ceremony of Remembrance, Renewal, and Commitment is held every year in the month of the spring equinox. This natural event has in all times, everywhere been a universal symbol of the end of the long dark and despair of winter and the new beginning of light and life as spring returns.

So, too, as the sun sets in the west, the west sometimes represents darkness, death, or those things that are past and have gone before. The east, on the other hand, often represents light, life, new beginnings, and things that are yet to come. Recognizing that both of these experiences are a natural and necessary part of life helps us to grieve the times of loss and despair in our lives, and yet to emerge from those dark times in hope and rejuvenation--determined to make the world a little better through our actions.

The above paragraphs are from words I wrote in March of last year. In the spring of 2013, then Wise Master Roy Snyder asked me to put together a short piece about some of the symbolism found in the Rose Croix Ceremony of Remembrance, Renewal, and Commitment. I did as Roy requested and provided a few paragraphs to include in the program pamphlet for that event.

At the time, I appreciated the truth and the beauty expressed in these symbols and in that ceremony from an almost purely intellectual and philosophical perspective. Less than a year later, I came to appreciate the meaning behind these symbols from a more personal and emotional perspective as well.

On January 9th, my mother-in-law passed away very unexpectedly as a result of a post-operative infection. Obviously, this was a devastating time for our family. We experienced the shock, grief, loss, and questioning that inevitably accompanies those circumstances. Yet, in the midst of these feelings, even on that very first night, there was a source of some comfort that we could draw upon to help us through the darkness.

My mother-in-law, Chang Sun, was always a very faithful person, and she lived with a healthy anticipation of that someday when she would be again reunited with her Creator. A priest from the church that Chang Sun attended was present to lend his sympathy and support and to lead us through the rites appropriate for such times. The father was caring, compassionate, and sympathetic and was a great help that night.

However, what I remember most from that night was a natural symbol, at once both subtle and striking, and all the more potent due to its seeming coincidence. Chang Sun loved plants, and she raised several orchids in the apartment where she lived. On that winter evening when she passed, it was remarkable to see that a number of her orchid plants had recently blossomed beautifully.

My wife and I instantly recognized the message. Like the rose of eternal life blooming upon the cross of death and sorrow, through the events that night Chang Sun's immortal spark was opening to her new life in a much better place with her Creator. In the days and weeks that followed, Chang Sun's other orchids continued to burst forth with new flowers as if to continuously reinforce that message to us in our family's moments of deepest sorrow.

The symbols and ceremonies of the Rose Croix--the Ceremony of Remembrance, Renewal and Commitment; the Rose Croix Funeral Service, and the ceremonies of the Rose Croix degrees--all seek to reinforce and remind us of the eternal truths taught by the lessons of faith. These truths reassure us that our departed

loved ones live on; that death is not an enemy, but a friend and not an end, but a transition. Essentially, these truths remind us that we need not weep for the dead, but for the living.

I found this aphorism to be true. We do not weep for the new life of those we love, a life which we are confident is more peaceful and beautiful than any we may know in our day to day existence on Earth. Rather, we weep for ourselves, for the new life that we must now lead without our beloved departed, and for all the moments and words and experiences with them that we hoped for but which will not be (at least not in the way we knew before). We are left to find our new normal in our life now without that person. No, we need not weep for the dead, but we should have compassion for the living.


It is during this time of readjustment to one's own life that the help and support of other people is a special blessing. (My family is extremely grateful for the help and support that we received from my Masonic brothers, our friends and our family.) These people remind us that we are still part of a larger world--one where we are still needed to laugh and love, to work and play, to serve and contribute with others. Faith reminds us that our loved ones will live on; friends and family remind us that must and will live on, too.

Remembering how precious is the time we have, renewing our ties with life and society, and committing to make the most of ourselves and our days ahead is not only important for recovering from our sorrow, it is also the best way to honor the lives of our departed.

We see the same pattern of moving from light, through darkness, and back to light as symbolized in the Ceremony of Remembrance, Renewal, and Commitment as we see played out in the cycles of the Sun and the Moon and also in our experiences around the passing of a loved one. It should be clear to us as Masons that this similarity is not mere coincidence, but that these events each reflect a single principle operating in different areas. And like the movements of the heavenly bodies, the experience of losing those we love is inevitable, unstoppable, and beyond our control. It is also a part of the natural course of life, and ultimately, provides more depth and richness to our existence than would eternal life or an everlasting noon day sun.

Therefore brethren, let us learn to appreciate each day that we have with those we love and even those days we have after they are gone.

The Morality of Freemasonry

"There is but one temple in the world and that is the body of man." - Carlyle

As you can tell, I use this format to talk about and discuss aspects of our fraternity that I don't find in other avenues. This month's topic is one that is often only superficially touched on, probably because it hits nerves that make us uncomfortable and shows us areas in our life where we need to improve.

We surround ourselves with good men and that is well and right. But we don't get the full effect of this if we don't work on ourselves and change who we are. The man who first knocked on the outer door of a lodge should not be the same man you are today. If you are still that man, then the principles we promote to the world did not work and are just empty themes. They are of no effect and, as Jack Sparrow the character in the modern pirate movies says, become "just guidelines." I hope that each year and with each position or chair you may find yourself in, that you learn and better yourself. A part of improvement is becoming a good, moral man.

"We may disguise it as we will, we may evade a scrutiny of it; but our character as it is, with its faults and blemishes, its weakness and infirmities, its vices and its stains, together with its redeeming traits, its better parts, is our speculative temple." - John Lodor

The final product of this morality is the building we so hear about but know so little of – a temple, not made with stone but with flesh, bone, and blood. We should be moral men because it is what is required of us. We cannot advance in many of the lessons and principles we seek without doing this. A side panel to this is so outsiders cannot use our actions or words against us.

I know this sounds very self righteous, but this message is for me as well as for you the reader. I think we have lost some of our basics and this topic is one of those long forgotten ideals. To be good is to be what we are supposed to be. That theme is woven all through our low and high degrees. Being a moral man allows us to be measured or tested by the very tools we admire. If the square finds us true in our corners and angles, we pass the test of being "right." The plumb sees us upright, not just in our relationship between the horizontal foundations; but with God and man. The twenty-four inch gauge shows our true measurement and how we have worked out expending our time and energy. These tools are the basic, starter set; ones which we must master first before we are tested by much more advanced tools of the Scottish Rite (yes we have tools too!).

This doesn't mean that we will not disagree on the definition of what being "good" is or what a Mason should be like or that we will agree on everything concerning the running of our Scottish Rite. How we treat each other, our relationship to those without our fraternity and what we aim for should be very similar in this definition. This topic is very much where the rubber meets the road for us. We need good men; we need them to be leaders, to be standouts in our community, to fill our ranks and to change the world.

You can see why it is so important for us to be good. Without it we lose our general purpose and central ideal. We will never be perfect here on Earth, but we can advance up the ladder of principles and be what we claim to be. A knowledgeable Mason without grace, love, helpfulness and restraint is like a fancy car that has all the extras but doesn't run. It looks good in the driveway, our friends stop by, admire it and talk about it; even take pictures of it, but it doesn't do what it was intended to do – go further than look nice in the driveway.

If all this seems too out of place or odd to you; pick up the Grand Lodge's Clear Text Key (page 204); it says: "A Mason is obliged by his tenure to obey the moral law, and if he rightly understands the art, he will never be a stupid atheist or an irreligious libertine."

Pick up the working tools of a degree or any of the various regalia that go with it and think on the purpose for which they were made. You will see that they are made to construct a worthy building – you.




