## **VOLUNTEER?**

Some of us might remember the TV show "Dobie Gillis" where his friend, the hippie Maynard G. Krebs, would exclaim "WOOOORRRKKK" in a high pitched fearsome voice whenever anyone suggested that he get a job and actually go to work. Well, sometimes I think we collectively have the same aversion to the word "volunteer." After all, we were always told that "NAVY" was an acronym for "Never Again Volunteer Yourself."

Are you afraid to volunteer? If so, WHY? # **APRIL**

Ever wonder where the names of our months came from? This is the fourth in a series that delves into the origins of the words we use for our months of the year.

The Romans gave this month the Latin name <u>Aprilis</u> but the derivation of this name is uncertain. The traditional etymology is from the verb *aperire*, "to open", in allusion to its being the season when trees and flowers begin to "open", which is supported by comparison with the modern Greek use of  $\dot{\alpha}$ voi $\xi\eta$  (*ánixi*) (opening) for spring. Since some of the Roman months were named in honor of divinities, and as April was sacred to the goddess Venus, her <u>Veneralia</u> being held on the first day, it has been suggested that Aprilis was originally her month **Aphrilis**, from her equivalent Greek goddess name Aphrodite (*Aphros*), or from the Etruscan name <u>Apru</u>.



Timanthes was a celebrated Greek artist of the 4<sup>th</sup> century B.C. As an aspiring young painter, Timanthes worked with a respected tutor to learn his craft (sound like something we do as Masons in our lodges?). After several years, he produced what HE believed was his masterpiece.

Delighted with his accomplishment, the young artist stopped striving to further his art. Instead, he devoted hours each day to simply gazing at his painting, mentally patting himself on the back for this magnificent achievement. Then, one morning, when he arrived at the studio, he was horrified to find that someone had slathered paint across the canvas, destroying his work. His tutor eventually confessed that he'd done the deed.

"I did it for your own good," he explained. "The painting was holding you back." He urged the artist to try again: "See if you can do better."

Timanthes took his teacher's advice. His next effort, "The Sacrifice of Iphigenia," became his signature work and is widely regarded as one of the finest paintings of its time.

You should celebrate jobs done well. But, don't get so caught up in yesterday's achievements that you lose sight of today's challenges which are really only to-morrows opportunities to excel.

Gerry had his own opinions on just about everything that often differed from anyone else's. A lesson many of us learned very quickly was that if we asked for his advice, then we could not be upset if he didn't agree with us. He called them as he saw them, and I always respected him for that.

He always made himself available to all members of the Craft, young and old, with all their questions and comments and never deemed anyone unworthy of his time.

One piece of advice I received from Gerry that I will never forget was when he decided he could no longer give the King Solomon role in the 3<sup>rd</sup> degree his full attention, and I came to the part. I was nervous about doing it the "Gerry Way" and had doubts I could do the part justice. I talked to him about this and he said just a few simple words: "JUST BE YOURSELF," and I have never looked back.

It is safe to say, that in the quote used at the beginning of this missive by Charles Kingsley, Gerry never did lie down at night without saying that he was able to help someone, make them a better person.


So, how do you say goodbye to such a friend and Brother? You don't! You keep him in your heart and mind forever.



he **Denver Consistory** participates in **Doors Open Denver**, an open-house event aimed at introducing historic buildings to the Denver public.

This is a great opportunity to expose the public to the Denver Consistory.

While some people may inquire about the Scottish Rite and Freemasonry, our purpose is *not* to sell Masonry.

Generally, the building speaks for itself, and we are asked to confine answers to questions of the building's history. As such, opportunities to discuss some Masonic history will likely emerge. However, such discussions are taken to be secondary and forwarded in context of the building only.

## HAVE A "SMART" PHONE? Expect more Scammers this year!

- Nearly 70% of smartphone owners say they receive unwanted spam messages.
- They are 3x more likely to respond to spam than on their desktop or laptop computers.
- More than 1/4 of text message spam—such as free gift cards, cheap medicines, etc., are intended to defraud you by taking you to questionable websites where malware resides.
- DO NOT click on links or follow instructions to stop or prevent future texts. This confirms to the spammers that you are a live and active number that can be exploited.
- The ONE-RING SCAM
  - Leaves a voice message asking you to call a specific number because you won a sweepstakes, have an undelivered package, or owe the IRS back taxes.
  - Preprogrammed to disconnect after one-ring—and rely on your curiosity to find out who called. DON'T return those calls.
  - Area codes may LOOK like they are U.S. based, but they may be international, causing very large phone bills to be charged through long holds, forwards, etc.
  - Typical (but not exclusively) area codes to watch for: 268, 284, 473, 649, 664, 767, 809, 829, 849, 876.
- BANK MESSAGES
  - Text message claiming to be from your bank or credit card company (even though you may not do business with them) telling you there's a problem with your account. You are instructed to click a link (DON'T DO IT!) which leads you to a LOOK ALIKE website that is run by a scammer trying to get your name, account number and logon credentials.

Your bank or credit card company MAY telephone you with a fraud alert, but it will NEVER ASK YOU FOR PERSONAL ACCOUNT INFORMATION (after all ... they already have that info.


