Well, the 2017 KSA Burns Night was, by any measure you wish to use, a COMPLETE SUC-CESS! With 170 attendees for the dinner and 60 for the Whisky College beforehand, it was a SELL-OUT. To everyone who came, thank you for the support of our KSA, and I'm SURE that you enjoyed the evening - every bit as much as I and my grandkids (1 and 4 years old) did as well. I think it's important for everyone here to know that OUR Burns Supper is not just unique, but it is also probably the BEST VALUE of any Burns Dinner in the Denver area. We charged \$35 for dinner (and it was a nice one at that), and \$15 for the Whisky College (optional) beforehand—and you not only got to hear about and sample some rare and excellent Scotch, you got to keep the firing glass that was used as well.

Now, to be candid, there ARE at least two other Burns Suppers in Denver. The largest being associated with the St. Andrew Society of Colorado. I don't want to disparage their event, because I'm SURE it was excellent as well. But, they charged \$70 a head IF you were a member and RSVP'ed before 11JAN or \$75 if you were a non-member. If you RSVP'ed after 11JAN, it was an extra \$5 for both categories. Now, they did have a choice of 4 different entrees, but that was because they held their dinner at the DTC Marriott where the kitchen staff could do that for a large crowd. They pretty much had a similar program to ours, but they did have the SASC Scottish Country dancers, the Rocky Mountain Highland Dancers, and the Colorado Youth Pipe Band...but they did NOT have a "Whisky College" - and they did not have the traditional Quaich Circle at the end of the evening.

As well, the Clan Donnachaidh (Donna-Kai) Society of the Rocky Mountains held their Burns Supper a week after ours and St. Andrews Society's, at the Ramada Plaza Denver North. Theirs was \$50 for members, \$55 for non-members, and it was a BUFFET dinner with a cash bar. Their advertisement says they have their own Burns dinner with a Piper, haggis, drawings, and Celtic music by local performers. (Sounds a lot like ours, except still no Whisky College, and no Quaich circle and you have a "buffet" - not sure how well haggis would go over there.)

So there you have it. If you are even remotely interested in a Burns Night celebration, OURS is not just the best value for your money, it's also the best all-around example of a Burns night celebration you're going to find in Denver.

To be fair, if you were to attend one in Scotland, chances are it would be STAG (male only), there would be LOTS of Scotch, cigars, and some rather crude and ribald humor, and the MAIN COURSE would be haggis - none of this more civilized behavior we have over on this side of the pond.

Can the KSA count on seeing you at the 2018 Burns Night Dinner? I hope so. I'll be there.

Denver Consistory 9Health Fair - Saturday, April 22 from 7:00 AM to NOON

Mark your calendars and plan to help us as a volunteer for our 23rd 9Health Fair at the Consistory (this will be 9HealthFair's 38th annual fair—so we have been with them for a significant majority of time). There is a 20% discount on test fees for VOLUNTEERS and 1st-timers.

This year, there will be a new optional blood screening available. You can get your blood tested for testosterone levels (\$35 for males; \$45 for females - higher cost for females is due to the complexity and processing of that particular sample). Women have a smaller amount of testosterone than men, but it plays an important role in both men and women. It affects the brain, bone, and muscle mass, fat distribution, energy levels, and the vascular system.

There will also be a FREE Vitamin B12 blood screening if you participate in any other blood draw at the fair. Vitamin B12 is responsible for keeping blood cells and nerve tissue healthy, preventing a kind of anemia called megaloblastic anemia, and forming DNA. Insufficient B12 in your diet leads to pernicious anemia, neuropathy, depression, fatigue, constipation, and lack of appetite, among other things.

MEMBERSHIP STARTS IN THE BLUE LODGE

Many of us are familiar with the membership trends we are seeing in Masonry and related bodies. Each of our organizations has a membership committee charged with reversing the decline and building membership for our future. We have identified a myriad of reasons WHY membership is declining. However, we know that there are good men out there looking for spiritual and philosophical fulfillment as well as the fellowship that goes along with membership in a true brotherhood. The challenge is finding and engaging those men in order to help them find what they are already looking for.

In the past, the local lodge was a key component in every community. As our cities and suburbs have sprawled, community activities have spread further from the town centers which typically housed our temple buildings. Our temples tend to be dark and unoccupied except on meeting nights. If a community does have annual events such as fairs or parades, the fraternity is not represented as it was in the past. The bottom line is that <u>we are not as visible in our communities as we used to be.</u>

Our modern society has given rise to the need for more public awareness activities. The MW Grand Lodge of Colorado has a Public Awareness Committee that is charged with helping us do just that. One of the programs sponsored by the Public Awareness Committee encourages Blue Lodges to participate in community fairs by setting up a Masonic Awareness booth and talking to interested people about the fraternity and related organizations. This activity puts Masonry in a place where men who are looking for us can actually talk to us and find out more about our fraternity. Some approach us out of curiosity, but many have already been thinking about Masonry and have not found another way to connect with us. My Blue Lodge has tried this approach and it is paying dividends, not only in more new members, but also in the engagement of our existing members.

16 WAYS TO KILL AN ORGANIZATION

- 1. Don't attend meetings. If you do, arrive late.

DID YOU KNOW?

The word <u>February</u> comes from the Roman festival of purification called <u>Februa</u> or <u>Februalia</u>, a time when people were ritually washed and sacrifices were made to atone for sins. Some believe that it came from the old Roman God FEBRUUS, but it appears he was named after the festival, not the other way around.

February originally had 28 days until circa 450 BC when it had 23 or 24 days SOMETIMES every other year, until Julius Caesar, when it had 29 days on every fourth year and 28 days otherwise (as we do today).

"Much Ado About Nothing" is the ONLY Shakespeare play that mentions February.

February is the only month that can pass without a full moon. It will occur in 2018.

Ancient Greeks believed that amethyst (birthstone) protected the wearer from drunkenness.

February is also known as:

Febrero (Spanish); Febbraio (Italian); Février (French); Februar (German); and Февра́пь (Feb-Ral')(Russian). In Old English it was Somonath (Mud Month) or Kale-monath (Kale or cabbage month). The Saxon term was Solmonath (cake month).

THE SILENT TILER

The Tiler at Cariboo Lodge #469 in Barkerville, British Columbia, Canada, required neither sword nor trowel to perform his job. Cariboo had a "Silent Tyler" that was designed to keep out "wild men and some equally wild women." Barkerville must have been an interesting town in the 1860s. When Cariboo was constructed in 1869, the brethren designed and installed an OUTDOOR stairway that was the only avenue of ingress to or egress from the second story Lodge Room. This stairway was hinged at one end, allowing it to be raised once the brethren were assembled on the upper floor. With the Silent Tyler raised, access into the Lodge was effectively cut off, thus thwarting any cowans, eavesdroppers, or prying eyes. This safeguard acted in a manner one might liken to a drawbridge. The stairway on the left side of the building was raised and lowered by means of an operating wheel and pulley system installed in the Tiler's room. A latecomer could petition for entrance by tugging a cord that ran to an upstairs bell. Due to the security of this arrangement, the Lodge's Tiler served as both the Inner Guard and Tiler. In 1936, Cariboo Lodge and their Silent Tyler were destroyed by fire.

THE PRELATE'S PULPIT

However, some believe it started by a Christian in prison for refusing to pray to Roman Gods. He became friends with a prison guard and his blind daughter. After many years, he was called before the Roman Emperor Claudius to renounce his faith. He refused, and was beheaded. Before he was taken for execution, Valentine gave a note to his jailer friend to give to his daughter. As the girl opened the note, her eyesight returned and she was able to read the note which said, "From Your Valentine."
