

THEY'RE JUST MINUTE BOOKS!

Reverend Jim Harris' comments in the Prelate's Pulpit this month about our "HISTORY" as well as Brother Williams' piece on the 300th birthday of our Craft struck a familiar chord with me. You see, MANY years ago now, I was a newly made Royal Arch Mason in Scotland and I was helping set up the floor for the evening's meeting. As I gathered up the items from the closet, I noticed about four stacks of books, about five feet high just sitting on the floor. I turned to our "Scribe E" and asked him what those books were. He looked, and simply said "oh, those are the minute books of the lodge, Bill." You see, we met in the building used by Lodge St. Ninian's, #66 in Brechin on the rolls of the Grand Lodge of Scotland. It's a small lodge by most comparisons, but one that is quite old (founded sometime before 1714), so they had some pretty interesting artifacts for a new Mason to see, especially as this was the year after the USA celebrated its Bicentennial. So, I commented that the books were just SITTING ON THE FLOOR! My friend again said "but, they're JUST minute books Bill." I asked him how far back they went, and he told me all the way back to the founding of the lodge - at least when they started keeping written records in the early 1700's. OK, so "Jimmy, do you mind if I take a look at one of them?" (Sure). I picked one at random, opened it up and found myself confronted with what were entries obviously made with a quill ink pen - using those funny "ff" characters we see in some of our Revolutionary War era documents. It was hard to read in places because of the different spellings and grammatical structures, but it was very interesting. Thumbing through the book, I stumbled onto a specific entry that talked about three brothers of the Lodge who would not be at the meeting that night because they were in the highlands "with the Pretender." What this entry referred to was the massing of the Jacobites in Culloden shortly before Lord Cumberland's army massacred the clans at Culloden in April 16, 1746. The hair on the back of my neck bristled (after all, I actually had hair back then) much like it had when I walked over Gettysburg, Bull Run, Chancellorsville, and Manassas. It was as though the (Star Wars) "FORCE" was still hanging around those places. You got the immediate feeling that SOMETHING truly cataclysmic happened here. I turned to Jimmy and said "Jimmy, do you realize that an historian would literally KILL to have access to this kind of document?" And ... true to form, Jimmy only said "they're JUST minute books Bill."

Minute books, yes. But, they were being written by a man who had NO political reason to slant the commentary in his minutes. He's simply telling you what was happening at that location on that particular date.

When I was Associate Grand Guardian for Colorado Job's Daughters, I noticed a similar attitude about minutes of the Bethels. I suspect the attitude is similar for your lodge minutes. Shouldn't we be a little less "casual" about the nature of our minutes? After all, you never know who might be thumbing through those books a hundred years or more from now wondering what happened at your meeting last night.

Happy “Birthday” Freemasonry! - June 24, 2017 Marked the Traditional Tercentenary of Modern Freemasonry

Romantics have long opined that Freemasonry is as old as Adam (and his fig-leaf some sort of proto-apron), or at least Ancient Babylon (and the building of the Tower of Babel), or if not Babylon, then at least Egypt (the pyramids). And if not Egypt, then as old as the Exodus ... And for several hundred years, legends of Freemasonry’s antiquity charged new members with appropriate enthusiasm, as if initiation had led them to a secret center of forgotten power, long overlooked and ignored by the profane world.

Some of these theories may be called, aptly, “speculative” Masonry.

More sober authors, on the other hand, have concluded after much historiographical research into the topic, that Freemasonry is NOT as old as it was once claimed, but rather has a traceable formation extant in historical records. Members of the so-called “authentic school,” therefore, base their research on actual documents that record definite statements which are almost certainly associable with the Craft.

To a certain extent, both of these views—the so-called “Romantic” view and the “Authentic” view—are not as entirely incompatible as they may at first seem. Freemasonry is most certainly older than extant records indicate, although any “ancient wisdom” it purports to maintain must surely have existed in one form or another long before the society we now recognize as Freemasonry today laid any appreciable claim to it.

Of course the “official” inception of so-called “Speculative Masonry” is given a well-known and oft-cited date. Three hundred years ago, on June 24, 1717 - St. John the Baptist’s feast day - four London lodges of Freemasons met together and, tradition holds, formed the “Premier Grand Lodge of England.”

Those lodges met respectively at the **Goose and the Gridiron Pub**, in St. Paul’s Churchyard; the **Crown Alehouse**, near Drury Lane; the **Apple Tree Tavern**, in Covent Garden; and the **Rummer and Grape**, of Westminster. Tradition holds they met together and formed the first Grand Lodge. However, it would not be until 1813, with the adoption of the Articles of Union, that the United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE) would appear in the records, sprung from the union between the **Antients** and the **Moderns**. (Two rival “Grand Lodges” claiming authority over Freemasonry - sometimes referred to as the “great schism.”)

Despite this convenient and legendary founding, evidence of Speculative Freemasonry before this celebrated date exists nonetheless. There are minutes from Mary’s Chapel Lodge in Edinburgh, for example, that go back to 1599, and there is an unbroken chain of minutes held at Lodge Aitcheson’s Haven, also in Scotland, from January 9, 1599, as well. It stands to reason that, in order to have an assembly for which minutes were necessarily kept, these associations were operating previous to the dates of the earliest minutes on record.

Further, reference to the “**Mason’s Word**” is found in the latter 17th century as well; the

phrase "**Mason's Word**" appeared in 1672 in Marvell's "**The Rehearsal Transpos'd**" (viz: "those that have the *Mason's Word* secretly discern one another") and in 1696 in "**A New Dictionary of the Canting Crew**" we read the following:

"'Masons-Word': who ever has it, shall never want, there being a Bank at a Certain Lodge in Scotland for their relief. It is communicated with a strict oath and much ceremony, (too tedious to insert) and if it be send to any of the Society, he must (nay will) come immediately, although very Busy, or at great Distance." [See "**The Foundations of Modern Freemasonry**" by Rick Berman.]

In 1676 we find an entry in "**Poor Robin's Intelligence**," a satirical almanac, which is worth quoting for its allusions, as even then Freemasonry appears to have been subject to some ridicule. It stands to reason that the society must have been around long enough to gain sufficient notoriety to poke fun at them. The specific entry in question reads:

"These are to give notice, that the Modern Green-ribbon'd Caball, together with the Ancient Brotherhood of the Rosy0-Cross; the Hermetick Adepti, and the Company of Accepted Masons, intend all to Dine together on the 31st of November next, at the Flying-Bull in Wind-Mill-Crown-Street; having already given order for great store of Black-Swan Pies, Poached Phoenixes Eggs, and Haunches of Unicorns." [ibid.]

Sounds about right, doesn't it?

And, of course, evidence of speculative Freemasonry is readily discernable in the journal entry of Elias Ashmole, the famous antiquarian and gentleman of Oxford, from October 16, 1646, more than 70 years before that fabled meeting at the **Goose and the Gridiron Pub**. Ashmole, who was, in no manner, an operative stone mason, writes in his journal:

"[W]as made a Freemason at Warrington in Lancashire with Coll. Henry Mainwarring of Kerthingham in Cheshire, the names of those that were then at the Lodge, Mr. Richard Penkett Warden, Mr. James Collier, Mr. Richard Sankey, Henry Littler, John Ellam, Richard Ellam, and Hugh Brewer."

But Elias Ashmole, even though perhaps the most frequently cited example of an early Speculative Freemason entering the Craft, was NOT the first "gentleman" Mason history records. On July 3rd, 1634, 83 years before **the Goose and the Gridiron** meeting, in the Lodge of Edinburgh, William (Lord Alexander) and his brother Anthony Alexander (the King's Master of the Work), along with Sir Alexander Strachan of Thornton were initiated Entered Apprentices. Obviously none of these gentlemen were operative stone masons. Then in 1635 Archibald Stewart of Hesselsyd joined the Craft, followed by David Ramsay in 1637. David Ramsay was a personal friend of King Charles I.

Perhaps the most important "gentleman" Mason of note entering the Craft in their "pre-Craft" period is Robert Moray, initiated in 1641 at Newcastle-upon-Tyne, the first "speculative" Mason on record made in England. Moray was a founding member and the first president of the famous Royal Society. Moray (like Ashmole and Christopher Wren, who also claimed to be a Mason) was a pronounced esotericist, and his pentagram Mason's Mark is well known to curious students of the Craft.

FUN FACTS ABOUT OCTOBER

October is the month (in the Northern Hemisphere) when the first frost usually happens, leaves change color and fall. It's kind of weird that October isn't the EIGHTH (octo-) month for us, isn't it? Hawaii has a special October event called the "Aloha Festival" sometimes called the "Mardi Gras of the Pacific." Germany's Oktoberfest originally began on October 17, 1810, the wedding day of King Ludwig, I. However, the annual festival starts much earlier today, often in September. Daylight Savings Time ends every year at 2:00 a.m. local time on the last Sunday of October. Among the superstitious, giving an opal to someone NOT born in October is considered "bad luck."

The Credit Card “Da Vinci Code”

A pre-computer era security feature was slipped into your credit card numbers and remains there today. Pull out a card and pencil to see the math for yourself.

It’s true! Those raised numbers on your card are not only your account identifier that banks and merchants need to transact business on your behalf, but a little-known credit card version of the Da Vinci Code that verifies its validity without the aid of computers.

“It’s pretty cool that something was developed pre-computer era that is still in use today. I think that’s really important,” says Derick Niederman, an MIT-educated mathematician, New York Times Crossword Puzzle creator and author of many recreational math books, including “Number Freak.”

Even cooler, the code, which can reveal whether a credit card number is fraudulent, is cryptically hidden within the sequence of the card numbers. Every legitimate credit, debit, and ATM card on Earth uses this formula.

This low-tech mathematical sleight of hand, dubbed the Luhn formula after its inventor, Hans Peter Luhn, played a tangential role in the development of the World Wide Web search engines such as Google, text messaging, and other high-tech wonders.

CHECK NUMBER PLEASE!

In the unlikely event that you’ve given any thought to all the credit card numbers, you probably view them as merely a series of random numbers: 16 digits on VISA, MASTERCARD, and DISCOVER cards, 15 on AMERICAN EXPRESS, and 14 on DINER’S CLUB/CARTE BLANCHE cards.

On a 16 digit card, the first six numbers identify the card issuer and the next nine numbers are the card account number (AMEX uses an eight-digit account number). But, there is absolutely nothing random about the final digit, or key, to verify the card is valid. It’s this check number that gives the Luhn formula its DaVinci Code allure.

When a card number is generated using the Luhn algorithm, various combinations of the digits on the card must ultimately add up to a number that is perfectly divisible by 10. For this reason, Luhn’s formula is also referred to as “modulus 10,” or “mod10” for short. Change any digit or transpose any two digits and the Luhn check will catch it.

“At its essence, an algorithm is a mechanizing device. It’s a machine of sorts,” Niederman says.

The Luhn formula was designed to instantly detect accidental data entry errors

Such as missed keystrokes, transpositions, and the like—and is NOT a defense against fraud. It doesn't identify where an invalid number went sideways; it simply flags it as non-conforming.

Luhn checking won't tell you anything about the underlying card account itself. Nor should it be confused with card-verification value codes, those extra, unembossed numbers on major credit cards that attempt to verify that the physical card is (or has been) in your possession.

Try it for yourself, by following the directions below.

1. Enter your credit card number in the grid below (one number per cell).
2. Double every other number, starting with the second number from the RIGHT. Jot down those new numbers under the grid and cross out any old numbers you doubled.
3. If a new number has two digits, add both together. Again, jot down the new numbers and cross out the old.
4. Add all uncrossed-out numbers
5. Now check. Is the sum's last digit a zero? It should be, because a last digit of zero indicates a VALID CREDIT CARD!



1. DON'T let the moss grow on your Lodge's back.
2. DON'T imagine that you will advance on your popularity and good looks alone.

9. DON'T forget that your job is to ENABLE your Brothers in Lodge - not tell them why they can't.
