Presenting the 2018 Scholarship Winners

Dwight A. Hamilton Graduate Scholarship in Speech-Language Pathology By

At the September 17, 2018 Stated Meeting program for the Denver Consistory bodies, six graduate students will be recognized as the 2018 recipients of the \$5,000 Dwight A. Hamilton Scottish Rite Foundation of Colorado Graduate Scholarship in Speech-Language Pathology.

This scholarship is named for Dwight A. Hamilton, the fourth President of the Foundation's Board of Trustees since the Foundation's creation in 1953. It was Illustrious & Most Worshipful Brother Dwight's vision which inspired the creation of this scholarship, named after him posthumously.

The Board of Trustees awards this scholarship to second -year graduate students at the *University of Colorado - Boulder* (CU-Boulder) and the *University of Northern Colorado* in Greeley (UNC). These are the two universities in Colorado which have graduate programs in speech-language pathology. The Master's Degree is one of several requirements for certification as a speech-language pathologist.

Since the Foundation's scholarship program began in 2005, 76 students have been awarded this competitive, merit-based scholarship. A total of \$380,000 has been awarded over this 14 -year period. We are pleased to introduce the six scholarship winners for 2018.





Amanda Castañuela is a graduate student at CU-Boulder. She was born and raised in Colorado and received a BA in Speech, Language and Hearing Sciences from CU-Boulder. In addition to her classroom studies, Amanda has worked with three diagnostic teams at CU's Speech, Language & Hearing Center in Boulder: the Preschool Screening Team, Concussion Assessment and Rehabilitation Team, and the Fluency Diagnostic Team. Her intervention experience includes working with young clients exhibiting issues such as concussion, dyslexia, and autism spectrum disorder. Upon graduation she plans to work with children and their families in Colorado with a focus in serving all children including the underrepresented populations

Tatum Gomez is a graduate student at CU-Boulder. She is a native of Colorado and grew up in Jefferson County. In 2017 she worked in Argentina for 8 months teaching English to impoverished students. In addition, she interned as a speech-language pathologist assistant in Denver's Thompson Elementary School. Tatum received a BA in Speech, Language and Hearing Sciences from CU-Boulder. During her graduate work she has served as a speech-language pathology intern at the CLC Preschool, the Head Start Preschool, and Audiological Rehabilitation, all in Boulder. With her bilingual skills, she plans to work with students in Colorado.





Kelsey Wade, a graduate student at CU-Boulder, is from Illinois. She received her BA Degree in Speech, Language and Hearing Sciences at CU-Boulder. Prior to graduate school, Kelsey worked in Aurora Colorado as a bilingual speech-language pathology assistant. With this experience and in addition to her graduate clinical work, Kelsey has developed a keen appreciation of the need for speech therapy services to Colorado's Spanish-English bilingual children with speech and/or language disorders. Following graduation, Kelsey plans to return to Aurora, Colorado to work in either a school or home health setting.



Truth and Perception

As Freemasons, we spend a great deal of effort plumbing the depths of religion, philosophy, and those universal truths as presented to us through the various Masonic degrees and orders. Some of the insights derived from those lessons are easily discernable with nothing more than a passing observation, while others remain opaque and require disciplined contemplation to harvest their bountiful yield. While Freemasonry designs to ennoble our lives by drawing from a broad lexicon of traditions, the true benefits of those pursuits can only be realized once we are able to free ourselves from the limits of our own perception. Toward that end, you may find that one of the following parables may allow you to pause and evaluate how your own perceptions may be shaping your journey.

THE CAVE

In Plato's *Republic*, the ancient Greek philosopher presents the Allegory of the Cave. The dialogue describes a group of people who have been imprisoned from birth in a cave, and chained so that they are only able to see the wall directly in front of them. Behind them is a fire and every day their captors carry objects in front of the fire so that the prisoners only see the shadows of those objects as cast upon the wall. The shadows on the wall constitute reality for the prisoners because that is all they have ever known.

One day, a prisoner is freed. He looks around for the first time and sees the fire. The light hurts his eyes and he has difficulty seeing the shadows. He is told that what he is now seeing is real, instead of his old reality, but has difficulty accepting it. In his pain, he turns away from the fire and runs back to what he is accustomed to, the shadows on the wall. Someone then forcibly drags him out of the cave into the light of day, at which point he becomes angry and succumbs to more pain due to the overwhelming radiance of the sunlight. However, his eyes eventually adjust to the light and he is able to observe with awe and wonder this new world, including the stars and moon and night, and finally the sun itself.

Eventually, the freed prisoner returns to the cave now believing this new world to be superior and desires to bring his fellow cave dwellers out of the cave and into the light. However, as he re-enters the cave, he becomes blind because his eyes have adjusted to the exposure of the sun. The other prisoners then infer that his journey caused his blindness and are willing to kill anyone who attempts to drag them out of the cave on a similar journey.

There are many scholarly discussions surrounding Plato's Cave, but for most, the allegory contains symbolism used to describe the state of the world. The cave symbolizes the world, and the prisoners are those who inhabit the world. The chains represent ignorance, as they interfere with the prisoners seeing the truth. The shadows on the wall represent what people see in the present world, and the freed prisoner represents those few enlightened souls in society who have been enabled to see beyond our physical limitations.

THE BLIND MEN AND THE ELEPHANT

Originating from the ancient Indian subcontinent, this popular parable can be found in Buddhist, Hindu, and Jain texts. It tells the story of a group of blind men who are introduced to a strange animal, called an elephant. None of the men are familiar with its shape or form, and out of curiosity inspect it by touch. As they each grope about the animal, they describe what they feel.

The first man's hand lands on the trunk and he declares the animal to be thick like a snake; the second man feels the ear and professes that it must be some kind of a fan; the third places his had on its leg and swears it must be like a tree-trunk; the next man touches its side and concludes that the elephant is a wall; another man feels its tail and describes it as a rope; and finally the last man feels its smooth hard tusk and states that it is like a spear. The blind men cannot come to agreement on their differing testimonies and begin to assume the others are not telling the truth, eventually coming to blows.

Ultimately, this parable illustrates the range of truths and fallacies, implying that while one's experience can be subjectively true, that experience is inherently limited by its inability to accept other truths or a totality of truth.

THE GOLDEN BUDDHA

Many years ago, in Thailand, there stood a temple that contained a huge golden statue of Buddha. Word came to the village that contained this monastery that an army from a neighboring country was about to invade. So, the villagers decided to cover the golden Buddha with thick layers of mud and concrete so the army would perceive that it had no value. When the invading force arrived at the village, they passed by the temple and observed nothing more than a huge stone Buddha and therefore had no reason to plunder it.

Many years passed by as the army continued to occupy the country, to a time that no one remained who remembered the golden Buddha. The true nature of the statue was unknown until one day when a young monk was sitting on the knee of the large Buddha meditating. As he got up a piece of the concrete cracked off and he noticed something shiny and realized there was gold under the stone. He ran to the other monks shouting, "the Buddha's golden, the Buddha's golden!" When they all came out and realized he was telling the truth, they proceeded to take their axes and shovels and chipped away to finally reveal the golden Buddha.

The metaphor presented here is that each of us is born golden - that we are born connected, born knowing the truth, and one with the higher power. But, when starting at a very young age, we go to school, we learn from our friends and neighbors, and learn how to dress,

how to speak, how to act - eventually building up a casing to the point where we believe we are the stone Buddha, not the golden one.

Later in life, if we're lucky, something comes along that cracks our casing - a divorce, the loss of a loved one, a financial setback - something traumatic in our lives that knocks off a piece of our shell. Only in *that* moment do we get to look inside and see the gold, and from that point on, the shell and the concrete will no longer satisfy us and we spend the rest of our lives chipping away to get to the gold, because nothing else is as valuable.

THE LIBRARIAN

In the 3rd century B.C. there lived a man named Eratosthenes, the Chief Librarian at Alexandria in Egypt. One day, he came upon a papyrus book in which he discovered a peculiar account. In it was a notation that on June 21st in the southern frontier outpost of Syene, the shadow of a column would grow shorter as mid-day approached. Exactly at noon, when the sun was directly overhead, no shadow was cast. It was a common observation that someone else may have easily ignored, but would lead to a discovery that would literally shape the world.

Eratosthenes observed that on the same day and at the same time in Alexandria to the north, a column would cast a pronounced shadow. Some suggested the notation from Syene was in error or that someone had altered the record. But Eratosthenes thought to himself, why would anyone bother falsifying such a mundane observation?

He considered if no shadow was cast in Syene while at the same time no shadow was cast in Alexandria, then that would make perfect sense, assuming the Earth was flat. Likewise, if a shadow of a certain length was cast in the Syene while at the same time a shadow of the same length was cast in Alexandria, that it also made sense, on a flat Earth. However, Eratosthenes then asked, how could it come to pass that in the south no shadow was cast at noon, while in the north at the same time and day, a very pronounced shadow was present? The only answer was that the surface of the earth was curved. He further deduced that the greater the difference in the length of the shadows, the greater the curvature of the Earth. He then hired a man to pace out the distance between Syene and Alexandria, and noting the difference in the length of the shadows, he was able to calculate, to a high degree of precision, the circumference of the Earth - not bad for a man with no scientific instruments living over 2,300 years ago.

Reaching out over the millennia, Eratosthenes teaches us that if we have the wherewithal to look beyond our assumed understandings and question the things around us, that we too have the power to shape the world.






KING SOOPERS LOYALTY CARD
