## Centennial Lodge of Perfection Oration

The toughest thing about an oration is coming up with a topic in which you think your Brethren might have an interest. So, I decided to ask a few KCCHs for suggestions. One of my oldest Masonic friends thought I should present it in mime. Another suggested that we explore one of the thorniest questions known to mankind, first raised in Monty Python's <u>Holy Grail</u>, that being "What is the airspeed of an unladen swallow?'

As surprising as it may be, I decided to reject those ideas and, instead, go with a few of my thoughts about attracting membership to our Fraternity, and specifically the Scottish Rite. We ask that those who wish to join the Fraternity and the Scottish Rite part with many hundreds of dollars in fees for initiation. We also ask for many hours of their time to attend meetings, reunions, etc., that could be spent with family and friends.

How do we sell that? How do we convince a man that he should use precious resources for something that, arguably, does not provide immediate and direct benefit to his family and friends? How do we convince him that it is necessary to spend that money and dedicate that time to Masonry and the Scottish Rite? Each one of us has a different answer, and each of us can tell a few stories about people or events that have inspired us to serve Masonry. Those stories are important. They define the <u>VALUE</u> that we can offer to prospective Masons when asking them to part with their time and treasure.

My Masonic inspiration ... my value proposition for potential and existing members ... stems from something that happened to me in 1973. My wife, Lynne, and I had just graduated from college and gotten married. We were living in Gainesville, Florida. Lynne was in graduate school and I was working various jobs to provide a little support while waiting to attend law school. Heaven knows, we couldn't afford for both of us to be in school at the same time. To digress just a bit, at this juncture our III. Bro. Fenimore might observe that this was my last clear chance to decide to make an honest living. I blew it, though, and went to law school, anyway.

One of my jobs was driving a delivery truck half a day, or so, six days a week. Every week or ten days I made a delivery to a large ranch in central Florida. I usually met an African-American man in his late 60s and we had some pretty good conversations while unloading the truck. One day he held out his hand. On one of his fingers was a gold ring with a red stone and embedded in the stone was the Square and Compasses. (I really had no idea of the significance of the ring when he first showed it to me; in fact, this is my first memory of hearing ANYTHING about Masonry. He told me that it was a Masonic ring and Masonry was the only

thing that made him feel truly free.

Well, I didn't fully comprehend the importance of his statement at the time. I went on with my life, going to school, working for a living, and helping to raise a family. It took many years, and perhaps, a good deal of maturation, to recall the incident and realize just how profound a statement my friend had made. This was a man who was just a generation or so removed from slavery. He had lived through Jim Crow segregation, so-called "separate but equal" treatment of the races, the Civil Rights movement, integration of schools, and so on. He had every reason in the world to be cynical, but above all, he knew he could rely on his Brothers to meet him on the level.

Here was a man who believed in what I am convinced is our value proposition. Masonry provides the skills and opportunity to realize the American dream - that ANY person can take advantage of the opportunity to succeed. We focus on individualism ... a sense of self-determination ... within a Fraternal structure of shared moral values, enforced by publicly expressed norms and clear expectations for our conduct. We have established a multi-layered society in the Fraternity which stresses diversity of thought and opinion, and diversity of religious and political views, all the while providing support in every way possible for each of our Brethren. We do that without regard to a Brother's race, profession, background, beliefs, etc. At least as important as the Fraternity providing support to each of our Brethren, though, is the opportunity provided by our Fraternity to each of our Brothers to give support to his Brethren.

I came to Masonry rather late in life, and some might say that is unfortunate. There is no chance in the world that I will ever see a 50-year pin. Sometimes, I regret not having joined at an earlier age. At other times, though, I have thought that it might have been just as great a benefit to me that I didn't join until my late 50s. By then, I had experienced much of my business career. Our kids were adults, or at least getting there. It was maybe because I had such experience that I was able to readily see something that I might not have recognized as a young man. I quickly realized that Masonry offers the necessary moral and ethical guidance, as well as the practical tools (such as leadership, management, and governance skills), necessary to succeed in one's chosen endeavors, while allowing a man the rare opportunity to define the nature of success for himself without outside influence.

Those thoughts are reflective of those expressed by Albert Pike himself. He was convinced that duty was the object of Masonry and "the noblest destiny of man" ... "is to attain the truth, and to serve our fellows, our country, and mankind." It cannot be doubted that he believed there is no better way to fulfill that goal than through education in the Scottish Rite. He emphasized that a Scottish Rite education presents younger men "with salutary precepts and good examples, and accustoms them to reflect on the proper mode of living." For men of more experience, Masonry, he said, "affords them the opportunity of exercising their talents upon subjects eminently worthy of their attention." "The true Mason," said Pike, "is he who labors strenuously to help his Order effect its great purposes."

I summarize all of that as a call to action. We all have undertaken to improve ourselves in Masonry. Therefore, is it not incumbent on us to take all reasonable steps to attract good men to the Fraternity, giving them the opportunity to obtain a Scottish Rite education, if we are to

properly serve our fellows, our country, and mankind?

Again, I am sure that each of you has his own view about the value of the Fraternity to existing and prospective members. So, the critical question is how we deal with that knowledge. How do we use it to attract and retain members? I recently attended a lecture by our Senior Grand Warden, R.W. Bro. Michael Moore, who discussed the benefits of Masonry for not only our members, but to their families as well as the community at large. One of his concluding points was that we need to spread the word about Masonry, maybe subtly, but we need to spread the word. The average man and woman need to know who we are, what we stand for, and the benefits we provide.

Unfortunately, the community-at-large seems to have no meaningful understanding of Masonry or our good works. It is time for that to end. We need to indelibly embed the ideals of our Fraternity in the minds of our friends, family, and acquaintances just as the square and compasses were so obviously visible in my friend's ring. The community needs to know what we stand for. I understand that many years ago a man had to ask three times before he would be allowed to join the Fraternity. For a system like that to work, it presumes that men and women generally understand the benefits of Masonry. We have lost that, and we cannot expect men to seek us out unless they have at least some rudimentary understanding of what they might be getting into.

I am not suggesting that many of our Brethren do not do a great job spreading the word. I am suggesting that it is time to consider a more formal, institutional approach toward educating the public about Masonry. We must create a desire in a greater number of good men to become Masons. It just might be time for the leaders of the various Masonic bodies in Colorado to jointly develop and finance the implementation of a modern, professional marketing, recruitment, and communication plan, designed to inform the public of the values of Masonry and attract good men to the Fraternity. At the same time, any such plan must reinforce for our existing Brethren those values that attracted them to Masonry in the first place and keep them coming back. To increase the membership in the Scottish Rite we must, along with our Brethren in other Masonic bodies, engage in a diligent and concerted effort to increase the ranks of Blue Lodge Masons. I have no doubt that the Scottish Rite will then be able to successfully recruit its fair share of members. We have too much to offer for the outcome to be otherwise!







## From the Denver Consistory WEST

One cool Spring afternoon a few years back, I had little to do and decided to walk up to the Anythink Library that we are fortunate to have in our development. As I was browsing through the books, my eye caught a small little book "The Butterfly Effect: How Your Life Matters" by Andy Anderson. This is one of those small novelty books with only 122 pages.

It was one of those actions that you have no justification for doing, but I started flipping through the pages and it piqued my interest. I picked a comfortable chair and sat down to read.

The theme of the book is that all of our actions, no matter how small, have an impact on the universe. As Scottish Rite Masons, we learn that every action has a cause and every cause has an action and this little book demonstrated this concept with a couple of great examples.

The one that I was most impressed with goes something like this:

During the Civil War, on a farm near Diamond, Missouri, lived a farmer named Moses and his wife Susan. Moses and his wife did not believe in slavery and harbored a black woman and her infant son. On a cold night in January, Quantrill's Raiders rode through the area and burned the barn, shot several people, and dragged off the black woman named Mary Washington, who refused to let go of her infant son George. Mary was Susan's best friend, and with his wife so distraught, Moses sent word through the neighbors, looking for the woman and her son, and two days later arranged a meeting with the bandits.

Moses rode for several hours North to the appointed crossroads in Kansas and at the time arranged in the middle of the night he met with four of Quantrill's Raiders. They were on horseback and carrying torches, and they had sacks over their heads with slits cut for their eyes. There Moses traded the only horse he had left on his farm for a dirty burlap bag and its contents they threw to him.

Then Moses opened the bag and found a cold, naked, almost dead, baby boy. He put the child inside his coat to warm him with his own body heat and he walked all night and most of the morning to get the child to safety. There, he made a promise to the child to raise and educate him to honor the boy's mother he knew was already dead.

That was the night the farmer gave that baby his name. And that is how Moses and Susan Carver came to raise that baby, **George Washington Carver**.

When Carver was nineteen years old and a student at Iowa State University, he had a dairy science professor who, on Saturday and Sunday afternoons, would allow his six-year-old son to go on botanical expeditions with Carver. It was George Washington Carver who took the boy and instilled in him a love for plants and a vision for what they could do for humanity. It

was Carver who pointed six-year-old Henry Wallace's life in a specific direction, long before he became Vice President of the United States.


Henry Wallace was Franklin Roosevelt's second Vice President and served from 1941 to 1945, just before Harry Truman served as Vice President. Wallace was the former Secretary of Agriculture before being Vice President. While Vice President, he used his power to create a station in Mexico whose sole purpose was to hybridize corn and wheat for arid climates. There, he hired a man named Norman Borlaug to run the program.


In 2004, ABC News aired a weekly news segment called "Person of the Week." On Friday, April 2nd, Norman Borlaug at age 91 was honored for his specific corn and wheat seed that he developed which thrived in climates from the dust bowl of Western Africa to our own desert Southwest and Central America, and to the plains of Siberia across Europe and Asia. He and his hybrid crops have been credited for saving the lives of more than two billion people from famine. Borlaug also won a Nobel Prize and was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

So, in reality, should Norman Borlaug get credit for feeding two billion people, or maybe Henry Wallace who gave him the opportunity, or George Washington Carver who inspired Wallace, or Moses Carver who rescued baby George Washington Carver?

This is a real-life example of Cause and Effect. Each person made a choice that affected someone else's life and ultimately the world.

When I finished reading this story, the Double-Headed Eagle came to mind. One head is looking into the past, seeing that the most recent event is only a result of past events and past events are only results of prior events back to the beginning of time. The other head is looking to the future, seeing whatever I do today will have an impact on the future to eternity. So, our choices must be made wisely.


