Monthly membership fee payment is available - Are you tired of paying fees at the end of the year to all the Masonic bodies you are a member? You may pay your annual Denver Consistory membership fee in eleven easy monthly payments rather than one lump sum, eliminating one more year end bill to pay. By authorizing an automatic credit card payment each month at the end of eleven months your membership fee for the ensuing year will be paid. Contact the office to set up a payment plan.

Supreme Council created and installed an auto renewal program to pay membership fees. This program gives members the option to have their membership fees automatically deducted using a credit or debit card through the online Membership Portal.

You, Inc.



"But what does Socrates say? 'Just as one person delights in improving his farm, and another his horse, so I delight in attending to my own improvement day by day."" —Epictetus, Discourses, 3.5.14

When I taught economics, one of my favorite units was one we did on entrepreneurship. There seemed always to be several students whose parents were in business for themselves. But—even among those who understood that their family's approach to earning a living was fundamentally different from many of their peers—it was rare for them to fully appreciate the dedication necessary to build and maintain a successful business. Although that typically changed by the end of the semester, many were more likely to be critical of the time, effort, and energy that Mom and Dad put into "work" (Likely often feeling, "At my expense!") than to be appreciative of what it took to achieve that success.

Well, hey, that was the point of view of 14–15-year-olds, right? All that is very much a matter of one's perspective, but, ultimately, that's my point ... so hang in there with me for a bit: this may not be going where you think it's going!

I've heard it said—as an admonition to maintain perspective and keep one's priorities straight—that "No one's last words were ever 'I wish I'd spent more time working and less with my family." That, I suppose, was the attitude of those students, as they believed they were being short-changed because of the family business. They may have been right, and it's certainly true that opportunities we lose (soccer games, parent-teacher conferences, piano recitals, table-talk), in those tradeoffs [8082497] for other obligations, can never be regained. As the years pass and our own perspectives and priorities evolve, we may well come to regret some of those tradeoffs.

"Work vs. family" or "work vs. leisure" ("All work and no play...") are the classic compromises we come to realize...in time to adjust if we're fortunate. But I would suggest to my Brothers this month, that we ought also to consider whether we devote what we should to the lifelong business of improving ourselves: an obligation which needs to be taken as seriously as those of livelihood, relationships, or even rest & refreshment. Although our basic involvement in the Craft makes this an endeavor admirably begun, it is still a decision which, alas, is all too often given short shrift.

Not surprisingly, for those who take the ritual and lessons of the Rite seriously, the issue is, at its heart, a familiar one: balance ... harmony ... equilibrium! It really makes little difference whether we learn this lesson in receiving the EA's working tools or in the lectures of a Master

of the Royal Secret. Our lives, regardless of how early or how belatedly we embrace the message, will be the richer for realizing that we owe the development of our inner selves at least as much attention as that which we put on display for others to see, for all to judge us by, and for those closest to us to value.

You may see this as advancement of the emotional, spiritual, or intellectual self ... as all three rolled together ... or each as a quite separate and distinct part of who you are. The point (much like the entrepreneur who overlooks some aspect of his business), in taking a shortcut toward one measure of success over another, is that we may ignore something of critical ... or even immensely greater ... value. That is a mistake made at the ultimate peril of our happiness and, if we rightly understand its true measure, our success.

Several months ago, as I began physical therapy in the aftermath of my knee replacement, doctors, nurses and therapists told me, "This is now your fulltime job, at least until you hit your goals to recover fully." But no, I didn't do it as I was admonished to do ... not even close ... not until I realized that I was in real danger of not regaining full use of my leg! At that point, I began to take the advice of the professionals seriously, and now I'm relieved at the result. We pay a lot for all manner of professional advice, and we ought to heed such counsel. But who—if not you, yourself—is the "professional" most intimately acquainted with the business of your own life? Think of it as "You, Inc.": the enterprise in which you are the chief investor and both CEO and consumer!

Think about how often you've said (perhaps to a younger person) something like, "No one can ever take your education away from you." Sage advice, as far as it goes, but it's sadly still an incomplete statement, isn't it? It's short two words and should really be stated, "No one **except you**...!" As we look around us ... and, perhaps, in the mirror each day ... we encounter many who have effectively done just that.

So, my Brethren, I ask a seemingly simple question, albeit one with a world of complex implications: What do we do—what can we do—on a regular basis, for the sole and exclusive purpose of improving our minds ... refreshing our spirits ... taking another step along a path we began with "three distinct knocks?" What do we do to advance the journey to being a more complete person ... to be, as that Army recruiting ad once put it, "all we can be?"

Don't misunderstand my point here. I'm not talking, necessarily, about the study of heavyduty moral philosophy or even philosophy at all. In fact, the effort needn't even be directed toward anything normally considered "Masonic." It just must be something that will help "You, Inc." fulfill its purpose in the business of life.

Remember what we tell candidates in the 4th through the 14th Degrees? When we refer to the "Lodge of Perfection," we try to be clear that we're not referring to becoming perfect in any absolute sense. As we use it in the Rite, "perfection" refers to "completion" or "wholeness." The issue is not what will make us truly perfect … because nothing will! The question is rather, "What we are missing?" or "What will make us better … more complete?" To those questions there are as many answers as there are travelers on this journey! Whatever helps to further your journey is, therefore, legitimately "Masonic education!"

So, what new thing might you undertake to learn? Something that is not driven by the necessities of job, relationships, or existing interests or activities. What might you learn merely for the joy and benefit of stretching your mind or to intentionally risk "disturbing the symmetry of your biases," as one of my own mentors so aptly put it?

It seems to me, Brothers, that taking the time, making the effort, and expending the energy—and doing so most especially when we're inclined to say, "I'm too busy!" or "That's too difficult!" or "That doesn't interest me!"—is one of the surest ways to make an investment in "You, Inc." that stands to pay lasting dividends.



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June's Trivia Question: How did a statue and monument to Capt. William Morgan come to be erected and dedicated in Batavia, NY, in 1882?

Answer: The 1826 disappearance of William Morgan, in Batavia, NY and its aftermath (a.k.a. "The Morgan Affair") precipitated the Anti-Masonic Movement and launched a decades-long effort to discredit and suppress the Masonic Fraternity. It was an influential enough political cause to result in a severe drop-off in Masonic membership, the demise of hundreds of Masonic Lodges, and development of America's first "third party" organization ... and, oh yeah, the adoption of national nominating conventions to select presidential candidates. Yep, that was an Anti-Masonic Party innovation: 1832 ... nominee William Wirt ... a "former Mason" (EA & FC ... and I've not found evidence that he formally withdrew from membership) who refused to make any public statements critical of the Craft!

Eventually, the movement declined and—at least in terms of formal influence on public affairs died out. After the Civil War, there was a rise in the popularity of secret societies & in fraternal-type groups generally. Likewise, organizations formed and grew to combat the perceived or imagined influence of such groups, with some taking up the old Anti-Masonic banner once again. One of these was the National Christian Association, which collected public subscriptions, commissioned, and erected a monument in memory of the allegedly murdered (they would say "martyred") Morgan. Over 1000 people were reported to have attended the dedication ceremony, including representatives of several local Masonic Lodges.

Upon the base of the monument is this dedication:

"Sacred to the memory of Wm. Morgan, a native of Virginia, a Capt. in the War of 1812, a respectable citizen of Batavia, and a martyr to the freedom of writing, printing and speaking the truth. He was abducted from near this spot in the year 1826, by Freemasons and murdered for revealing the secrets of their order. The court records of Genesee County and the files of the Batavia Advocate, kept in the Recorders office contain the history of the events that caused the erection of this monument.

Member in the Spotlight By Thomas L. Gaffney, 32° KCCH 1st Lieutenant Commander Colorado Council of Kadosh

Gordon Calahan, 32°



I was born in Denver Colorado on February 25, 1940. Our family lived in down town Denver and I attended Denver Public Schools. I graduated from South High School where I was a member of ROTC and the Denver Chapter of DeMolay. My Father was an active Mason and we had a close relationship. My Father was an aviator and a General Contractor, thus I began flying at age 15. Soloed on my 15th birthday and became a private pilot on my 17th birthday. Also, began working for my Father, at Calahan Construction. I joined the Colorado National Guard and became a flight line crew chief, responsible for one of the F100 Super Sabers. I was called to active duty in 1960 [7369945] to help remove the missiles from Cuba and I achieved the rank of Staff Sargent. It was a great experience and fun for someone my age.

Along with joining the Colorado Air Guard, I applied to Denver University, where I learned I had dyslexia. I was a very poor reader, writer and speller. My only hope of entering DU was to take an additional year of high school, which I did. To finish my fourth year at DU, I needed to pass the Math and English proficiency test. Try as I may, I could not pass the English test, I was denied my degree. Seven years later, one of my professors called me and said, the school relented and DU gave me my degree. Twenty years later, I attended Colorado State University and graduated with an Executive Master's Degree in Business.

The Year 1961 was the beginning of three wonderful life time changes. I met my first wife, Sandy, a nurse. Started working in our family business and began my journey in Masonry. I retired from the business this year at 83 years old. Masonry has always been a part of my life, but the Shrine was my passion. I joined the Shrine Air Patrol and became president.

My first wife, Sandy and I were married twenty years, when unexpectedly she committed suicide. Alcohol had been a serious problem and we had both joined Alcohols Anonymous. 
