February is celebrated as the "month of love" (Valentine's Day). Here's a little bit of philosophy to reflect upon during this month when we focus on LOVE.


We celebrate the great truth, that no matter where we find ourselves, when two or more are gathered together in the name of all that is sacred and Holy, **THERE IS LOVE!**

#### **Automatic Membership Renewal Program**

Supreme Council has implemented an auto-renewal program to pay annual membership fees. This is a completely voluntary program that gives our members the option to have their membership fee automatically deducted using a credit or debit card through the online Membership Portal.

The automatic membership payment will occur in August annually for those who sign up for the program, and the payment will be applied to the following year. Members who sign up for the program will receive an email reminder a few days prior to the debiting of their credit or debit card. This program will give members the option to avoid the end of the year Masonic membership dues crunch as well as help ensure members are always in good standing.

A Point of Pride Revisited



#### A personal note...

By the time you read this, I should be about two weeks post-op from the first of (eventually) two knee replacements, and I want to express my appreciation for all the prayers and good wishes already received. I've been the grateful recipient of much advice and of more than a few warnings and admonitions - mostly in the vein of "do what they tell you to do" (I will, I promise!). I'll miss seeing you for a while, at meetings and Friday lunches, but all of that is the greatest possible incentive to get mended and back in the swing. See you soon!

#### A Point of Pride Revisited (Part 1)

One of our most frequent "bragging points," as a Fraternity (right up there with the Craft's charitable pursuits and community involvement), is the number of Brothers who have served in positions of power, influence, and public trust over our nation's history. Beginning literally "at the beginning," we can recite a seemingly endless roster of great Americans, who served in positions great and small - political, military, social, and commercial - and who helped shape a nation and society we believe is the greatest on earth.

We especially like to mention that fourteen of the forty-five men who have held the office of President of the United States were Freemasons. That's just a smidge over 31%, since Brother George took that first oath, in New York City, in 1789 ... on a Bible borrowed from St. John's Lodge No. 1, Ancient York Masons. The most recent "Brother President," Gerald Ford, had the distinction - one not even possible in 1789 - of being the only person to serve both as President and Vice-President having been elected to neither office!

In his great dystopian novel, *Animal Farm*, George Orwell has one character comment that "All animals are created equal ... but some are 'more equal' than others." So it is also with U.S. Presidents! Do all fourteen of "our guys" equally deserve to be bragged upon by the Fraternity? How has the Fraternity done, overall, in terms of providing quality leadership? Were they good Presidents ... good men ... good Masons? Have our Brothers been good stewards of the people's trust and "faithfully executed the office," as the oath calls on them to do? This month and next, I'll share a bit of what I discovered.

Looking at presidential (or any sort of) "greatness" can be a tricky matter. However, in the case of past Chief Executives there has been an effort (flawed, IMHO, but usable) at objectively measuring presidential greatness. It began, back in 1948, as a project undertaken by presidential historian Arthur Schlesinger, and it has been continued by contemporary academics. The survey attempts to quantify various aspects of performance by past Presidents and then use those measurements to rank them by their accomplishments.

In 2022, C-Span published results of the most recent of these surveys, and you can view them <a href="here">here</a>. You'll note that each of the listed Presidents is also a link, which you can follow to see how their various qualities contributed to their ranking.

For the most part, I find the survey one that largely avoids partisan bias, although, personally, I would not attempt to rank the performance of a President until at least 25 years after the end of his term. Since the last Masonic President left office in 1977, however, that isn't a factor here. The 2022 version does at least omit the current occupant of 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue! So, if you look at the overall rankings, judge for yourself how accurate the assessments are. My sole commentary on the survey would be to say that known socio-political "leanings" in academia are more apparent in the more recent rankings. Professor Schlesinger, in his time, was not without his political sympathies, but his successors have been, perhaps, less adept at veiling them!

So, that said, here are the rankings of our Masonic Fourteen:

If you're at all a U.S. history buff, both the "top three" and the "bottom three" are pretty predictable rankings. Who had a harder job handed to him on Inauguration Day than Washington or FDR? Lincoln (a non-Mason, darn it!) would be about the only other candidate, and he and GW have been #1 or #2 in these assessments since their inception. [7892821]

At the opposite end of the ranking are Brothers James Buchanan and Andrew Johnson: Ol' Abe's historical "bookends." Buchanan spent his four years in the White House (1857-61) never quite understanding that legal limitations didn't mean that he was powerless to try to avoid civil war! He believed that the national government didn't have the power to compel resolution of either the slavery or the secession issues. "Doing nothing," in the context of those times, was the one thing that the country couldn't abide, and, by the time he left office, seven southern states had seceded and were preparing for war. Buchanan retired to his farm in Pennsylvania proclaiming, "History will vindicate my memory from every unjust aspersion." It has not!

In the aftermath of the tragedy of the Civil War, it fell to Andrew Johnson (1865-69) to be the completely unfit and overmatched heir to Lincoln's legacy. Johnson became Vice President mostly on the strength of his having remained loyal to the Union, when his native Tennessee seceded. He was the only U.S. Senator from a secessionist state to remain in his position throughout the war (so, high marks at least for loyalty). Johnson, a Democrat, was nominated as Republican Lincoln's 1864 running mate, and the party chose to call itself The "Constitutional Union Party" on the ballot that year, in part to reflect their "strange bedfellows" electoral ticket.

Johnson's ardent loyalty to the Union was, unfortunately, not sufficient to prove the master of his less admirable traits. His violent temper, pettiness and strident racism made him, possibly, the worst choice to lead the nation on a path to reconciliation. We all know him as the only President, until recent times, to be impeached. He was saved from conviction and removal from office by a single vote.

To complete Part 1 of this look at Masonic Presidents, we'll look at one more highly ranked individual and one ... well ... not so much. Theodore Roosevelt and Warren Harding are also the "bookends" of a defining political era.

TR's assumption of the presidency, upon the death of Brother William McKinley, marks the beginning (at least of the presidential phase) of the Progressive Era in American politics. Teddy came by his reputation as an energetic, no-nonsense administrator, having been NYC police commissioner and, as we all know, organizer of the 1<sup>st</sup> Volunteer Cavalry regiment ("Rough Riders") in the Spanish-American War. Many of the recruits were cowboys, miners, lawenforcement officials, and college athletes, and they were known for their adventurous style and unorthodox tactics.

When the Republicans nominated TR as their Vice-Presidential candidate in 1900, it was mainly as a concession to the growing "Progressive" wing of the party, and neither the party bosses nor the re-election-bound McKinley were enthusiastic about the pick. He was on the ticket as a vote-getter ... and get them he did! The party stalwarts disparaged his assumption of the office when McKinley was assassinated in 1901. "Now look," one of them groused, "that d\*\*ned cowboy is President!"

Teddy as President was a genuine force of nature, increasing the power and the influence of the office as few have done: using the office as what he referred to as his "bully (excellent) pulpit." Conservation (including the expansion of the National Parks and other public land holdings), health and safety legislation, financial regulation, and combating corruption were all on the Progressive agenda ... and Roosevelt championed them all. TR's presidency set the stage for America's assumption of a larger role on the world stage.

America came out of World War I disillusioned and exhausted with the idealism of the Progressive Era. By 1920, what was wanted was a return to something less energetic ... less demanding ... and less expensive! The fires of Progressivism burned low and Warren G. Harding, a U.S. Senator and Ohio newspaperman, emerged from a deadlocked Republican convention as the compromise nominee. "He looks like a President!" ran the popular chatter, in what became known as "the front-porch campaign" ... with Harding doing substantially just that: staying home, doing informal interviews from the porch swing of his home in Marion, Ohio, and opining that what the country needed was "a return to normalcy" (which, FYI, isn't - or at least wasn't then - a word).

Unfortunately, what Harding "looked like" and what he was competent to do, as the country's Chief Executive, were two very different things. He rode a wave of indifferent popularity, though becoming increasingly disappointed and discouraged with the actions of people he placed in trusted positions ... right up to his heart attack and death in 1923! Scandals, involving massive graft and corruption, broke only after he was gone. What he knew of events and how he had been betrayed, by men he trusted, undoubtedly hastened his death.

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**Last Month's Trivia Question:** Who are the two Sovereign Grand Commanders interred at the House of the Temple in Washington, DC?

**Answer:** Ill. Albert Pike and Ill. John Henry Cowles, S.G.Cs. from 1859-1891 and 1921-1952 respectively, are interred in the Supreme Council's headquarters. They are the two longest serving S.G.Cs. in our history. Ill. Brother Pike is, naturally, a safe guess as an answer to just about any Scottish Rite trivia question ... "When in doubt, guess Pike!" He was - and it's almost too modest a term, even at that - a giant in the development and expansion of the Rite. His tenure, of course, predated the current House of the Temple building, but, if anyone's name is synonymous with the first hundred years of Scottish Rite Masonry, it is undoubtedly Albert Pike's!

Ill. Brother John Henry Cowles guided the Southern Jurisdiction during an important time in its modern development and growth. He actually lived in an apartment within the House of the Temple during his tenure. If you've been to that beautiful building, imagine for a moment living there ... and having free run of the place when everyone else was gone for the day! SGC Cowles traveled extensively, during his time in office, and was presented with many gavels in commemoration of his visits to jurisdictions all over the world. #### **Ball Discovers Non-Reactive Element - Associated Press (parody)**

BOULDER - The heaviest element known to science was recently discovered by Ball Aerospace Corporation physicists. The element, tentatively named Administratium, has no protons or electrons and thus has an atomic number of zero. However, it does have one neutron, 125 assistant neutrons, 75 vice neutrons, and 111 assistant vice neutrons. This gives it an atomic mass of 312. These 312 particles are held together in a nucleus, by a force that involves the continuous exchange of meson-like particles called morons.

Since it has no electrons, Administratium is inert. However, it can be detected chemically as it impedes every reaction it comes into contact with. According to the discoverers (now employed by Rockwell), a minute amount of Administratium caused one reaction to take over four days to complete, when it would normally occur in less than one second. Research at other laboratories indicates that Administratium occurs naturally in the atmosphere. It tends to concentrate at certain points such as government agencies, large aerospace corporations, and universities, and can actually be found in the newest, best-maintained buildings.

Scientists point out that Administratium is known to be toxic at any level of concentration and can easily destroy any productive reactions where it is allowed to accumulate. Attempts are being made to determine how Administratium can be controlled to prevent irreversible damage, but results to date are not promising.

You've sat at the same desk for 3 years, done the same thing for 3 years, but have had 3 different business cards.



#### **HOT Pipe Organ Capital Campaign**

Since 1916 the Temple Room at the House of the Temple has had an Organ to make our events even more special with music. The Shantz organ console located behind Lieutenant Grand Commander's Chair controls the sound from the 1,417 pipes located high above floor level. The acoustics perfectly allow the room to be flooded with sound. Typically, the organ is played by the Grand Organist for various Masonic events and ceremonies. On occasion, guest organists hold concerts in the Temple Room. The public also visits the Temple Room every week during tours at the HOT.

The current Shantz Organ needs rebuilding and improvement. Currently, only about 50% of the keys will produce correct sounds. This is why the Scottish Rite has opened the HOT Pipe Organ Capital Campaign to save our treasured Organ. We formed a committee of members with vast knowledge and experience in Organs to plan this work. We need to keep music as an important part of the ceremonies and rituals of our fraternity.

Our goal is to raise \$400,000 to pay for restoration, improvements to the instrument, and provide an endowment to pay for its maintenance and repairs in the future. Members all around the Southern Jurisdiction are giving, and we are making progress, but we are counting on every member's help – and your help – to reach the goal.
