



## RiteCare's Work with UNC

During the 2006-2008 timeframe, the Scottish Rite Foundation of Colorado is working closely with the University of Northern Colorado (UNC) in implementing an Early Language Intervention Program in Greeley. This Program – planned and managed by Dr. Kathleen Fahey, the RiteCare Program Director for UNC – is designed to create three important services. These services are: (1) a preschool-age group speech-language therapy program – scheduled to begin in mid-2007, (2) a cochlear implant troubleshooting laboratory – scheduled to begin in 2008, and (3) a assistive technology center – scheduled to begin in 2008. The last two services have never been available in this part of the state.

Several non-Masonic organizations are collaborating with the Foundation in providing financial assistance for program implementation. To date more than \$89,000 has been made available for the 2007 phase implementation with significant financial assistance provided by the Daniels Fund. The Scottish Rite Foundation and the UNC Foundation are working together in obtaining additional funding.

The UNC Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology Clinic will implement the group speech-language therapy program phase this summer. The Foundation's Board of Trustees will join me in a July meeting on campus to review progress and discuss further development and implementation plans with the Dean of the College of Natural and Human Sciences and other UNC officials.

This project is important in terms of its profound implication for delivery of enhanced services in an area of major population growth. Critical services will soon be available to children in northern Colorado who otherwise might have to come to Denver to receive care. In undertaking this project, the Foundation and its financial partners – most significantly, the Daniels Fund

and the UNC Foundation – are making possible the realization of insightful and visionary thinking, thereby adding meaningful value to the northern Colorado community. This is one of many ways in which the Scottish Rite is contributing to the role of the Masonic fraternity as an organization of great significance in the community.

### **AND THE GREATEST OF THESE IS CHARITY...**

Your Denver Consistory needs your help. While your Consistory is not in immediate financial danger, we find ourselves in a situation where it would be prudent, if not necessary, to establish an "Operational Endowment Fund" for the long term needs of your Consistory. The Operation Endowment Fund would use the income from the endowment to offset the increasing cost of operating your Consistory. While our main auditorium and dining room have recently been renovated, there are other areas that need attention. Also, things such as carpeting and roofs wear out and paint needs to be freshened.

How can you help? For our more senior members, we would like you to consider three possible avenues. First, an immediate gift of money or securities of \$5,000 or

\$10,000; second, a future bequest of like liquidity and amounts; and, third, consider a Remainder Trust for the future benefit of your Consistory. If anyone would like to make a bequest or set up a Remainder Trust, there are brothers who are attorneys that will handle the paperwork for you.

We would ask that our younger members consider: first, a long term gifting program of \$50 or \$100 per month; or second, the purchase of a significant life insurance policy that the Operational Endowment would own and be the beneficiary while the member paid modest premiums in relationship to the benefit. This would create a significant future gift and allow the Operational Endowment to use the current Cash Values, should that become necessary.

For those others that fall in the middle, we would ask you to consider any combination of the above-mentioned gifts.

The Operational Endowment Fund would fall under the general operations of your Denver Consistory and be a part of the 501(c)10 organization and, as such, not allow for these general donations to be tax deductible. However, if taking a deduction is important, bequests and donations can be directed to the operations and support of the Consistory Library and our new museum. Also, the above gifting strategies can be utilized to give to our charitable arms, such as the King Wheeler Fund, the Almoners fund, or the Scottish Rite Foundation, and on a tax favored basis.
